1972 COMPENDIUM OF STATE AIR POLLUTION CONTROL AGENCIES

Introduction

This Compendium of State Air Pollution Control Agencies is a companion volume to the 1972 Compendium of State Water Pollution Control Agencies with Regulatory/Policy-Making Responsibility issued in December 1971 by the Office of Intergovernmental Programs. It has been prepared to provide State and local governments, non-government entities and others interested in air pollution control programs with summaries of the statutory, organizational and functional means adopted by the States, territories and possessions of the United States to achieve environmental goals in the area of air pollution control. Principal information sources used include state codes and session laws, state air implementation plans filed with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), information supplied by EPA regional offices and miscellaneous directories.

The Compendium is designed to serve as a guide for identifying the principal provisions of the major state statutes relating to air pollution control^{1/} and the organizational structure through which these statutes are administered. It is not an exhaustive digest of State air pollution control laws. For example, State laws relating to the control of motor vehicle emissions are not included. A complete and detailed understanding of the air control laws applicable in each State would require an examination of the state statutes, together with any implementing regulations, executive orders and relevant judicial decisions.

In format, the Compendium follows the uniform configuration of the ten Federal regions (see map of Federal regions at p. v). States are listed alphabetically within each region.

The Compendium identifies the principal policy-making and regulatory organizations responsible for air pollution control in each State, the District of Columbia, Guam, American Samoa, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. The organizational structure of these agencies and their relationship to other State agencies are described diagrammatically. An asterisk identifies the official State air pollution control agency with authority to



accept and administer Federal funds and grants. The relationships of these State agencies to similar agencies in other States and to local agencies within the State are summarized briefly under the topic "Intergovernmental Cooperation". To the extent available, addresses, telephone numbers, and the names of officials are included.

General statutory references to the States' basic air pollution control laws are provided. In addition, specific references to particular powers and authorities, such as the adoption of regulations, conduct of investigations, enforcement, etc., are presented in tabular form. In some instances, the specific authorities included in this statutory table parallel the requirements established by EPA for State air implementation plans (40 CFR 51.11, 36 F.R. 22369 at 22400, November 25, 1971). However, the information presented in this Compendium regarding these authorities is not to be interpreted either as an endorsement of or an evaluation of the adequacy of these authorities. (For EPA action approving and promulgating State air implementation plans, see 40 CFR Part 52, 37 F.R. No. 105, Part III, pp. 10842-10906, May 31, 1972; miscellaneous amendments, 37 F.R. 15080-15091, July 27, 1972. See also EPA Notice of Proposed Rulemaking relating to approval and promulgation of air implementation plans for 25 states, 37 F.R. 11826-11848, June 14, 1972; EPA Notice of Proposed Rulemaking relating to approval and promulgation of air implementation plans for 12 states, 37 F.R. 15904-15113, July 27, 1972.)

Although every effort has been made to make the Compendium complete and accurate, state statutes are subject to change as are the membership and staffing of state and local air pollution control agencies, boards and commissions. Pertinent changes and updating of the information and listings will be incorporated in future revisions of the Compendium.

In the interest of developing a reference document for state air pollution control agencies which is both useful and current, your comments and suggestions concerning the format, scope and information presented in this Compendium of State Air Pollution Control Agencies are invited.

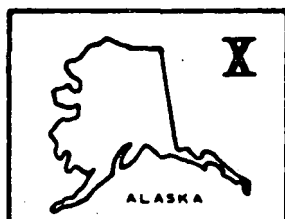

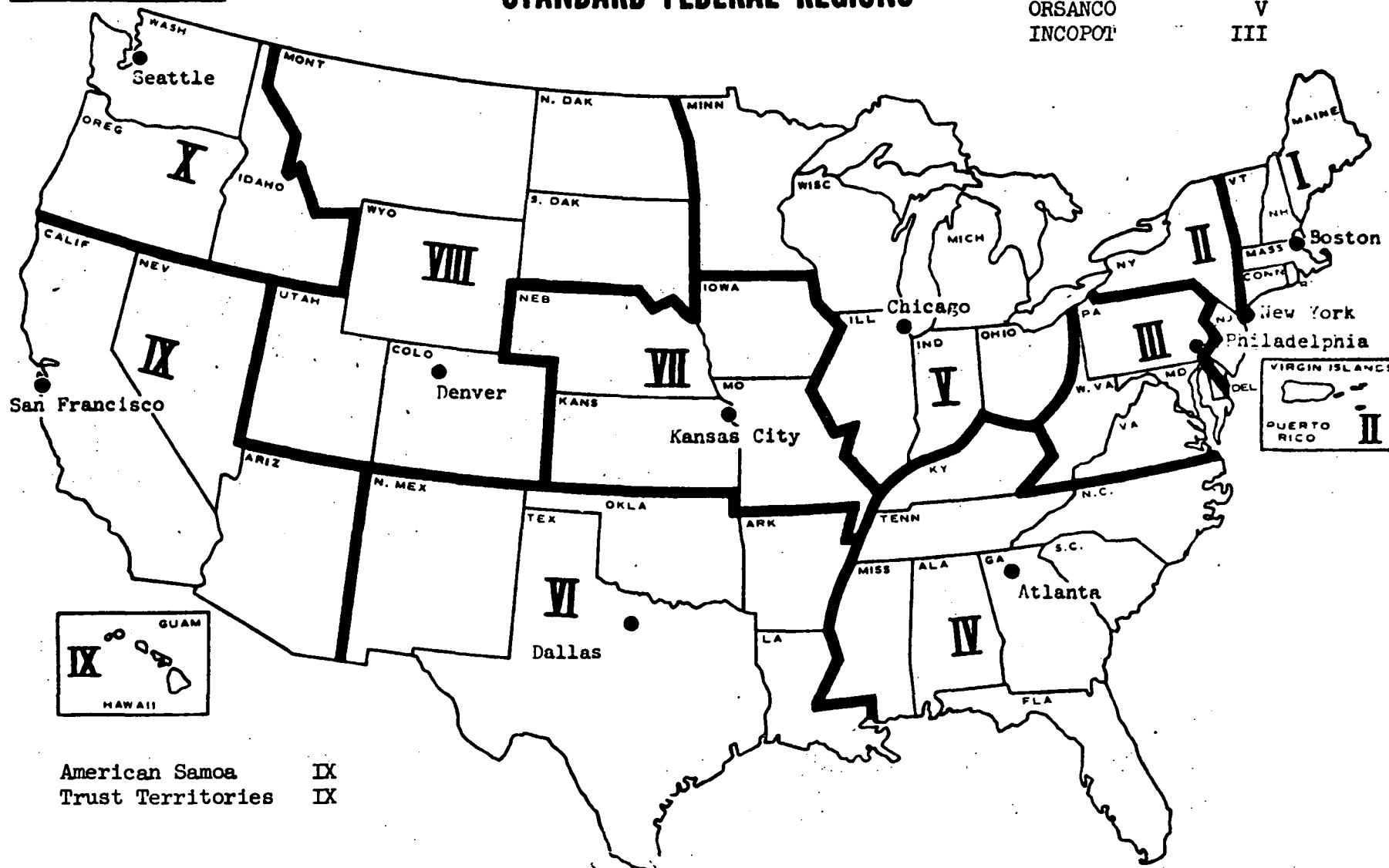

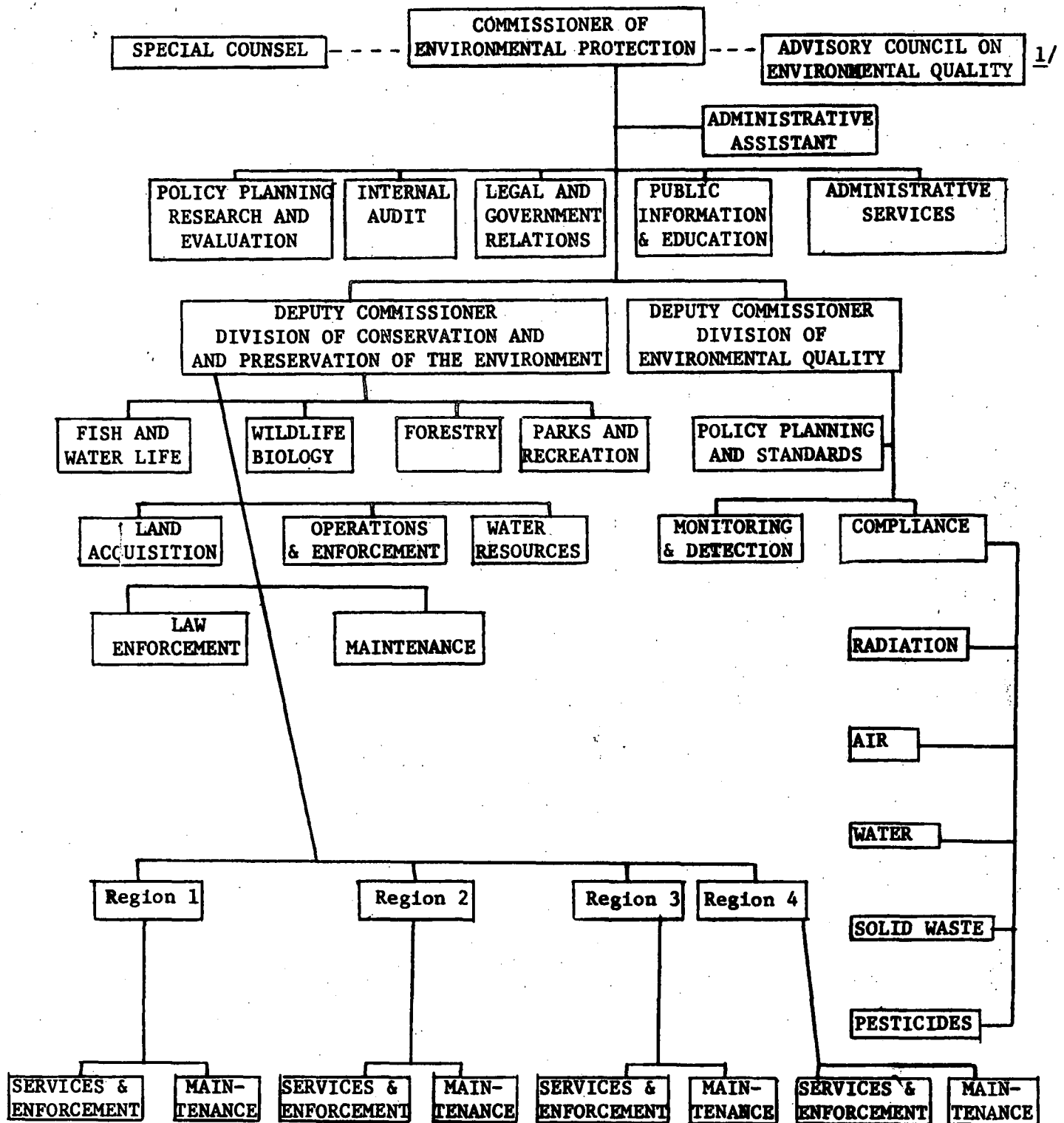

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

The Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection advises, consults and cooperates with other State agencies, Federal and regional agencies, local governments, industries, and other affected groups. The Department transmits information and data on emissions, air quality, construction of new industrial plants, and air pollution control strategies to air pollution control agencies in other states (Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, and Rhode Island).

Connecticut, New Jersey, and New York participate in the Interstate Sanitation Commission. The Commission collects air pollution data, conducts field surveys and inspections, makes complaint referrals and coordinates planning and emergency episode activities.

B. INTRASTATE

In Connecticut, the Department of Environmental Protection has primary responsibility for developing a coordinated state-wide air pollution control program. Subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Environmental Protection, municipalities and local air pollution control districts may adopt and enforce air pollution control ordinances and regulations identical to or more stringent than State regulations.

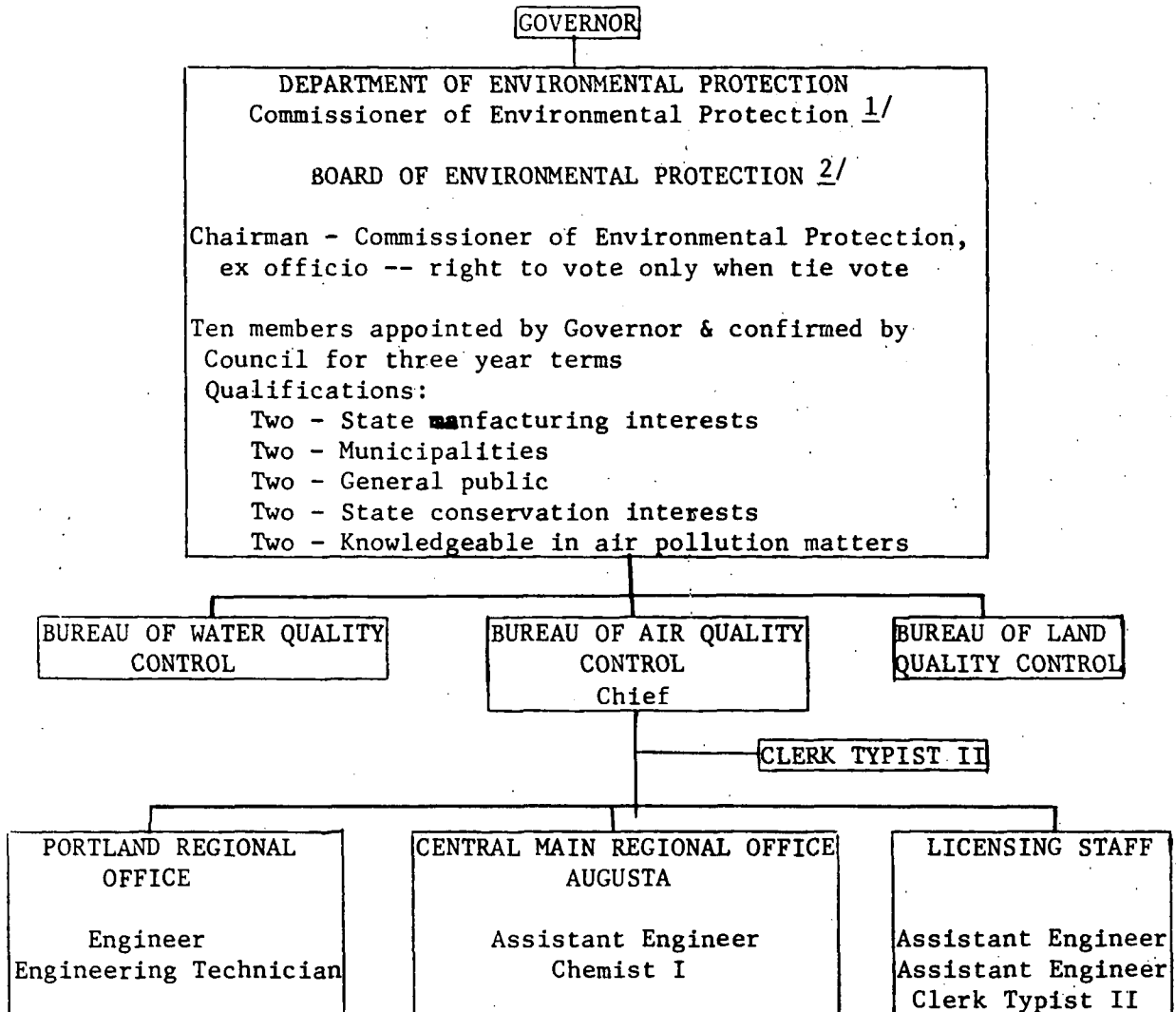

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

Maine transmits information and data on air quality, emissions, sampling, site location, licensing of new sources and activation of emergency episode procedures to air pollution control agencies in other states (New Hampshire)

MAINE

B. INTRASTATE

In Maine, responsibility for air pollution control is shared by the State and municipalities. Although the Department of Environmental Protection has primary responsibility for developing and implementing a coordinated state-wide air pollution control program, the State has not preempted the field of air pollution study and control. Municipalities are authorized to adopt and enforce air pollution control and abatement ordinances not less stringent than State law and regulations. Municipal ordinances are binding on persons residing in the municipality when they are more stringent than or touch on matters not covered by State law and regulations.

MASSACHUSETTS

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

Massachusetts has developed informal arrangements for interstate cooperation and coordination on air pollution control matters. Through the New England Staff for Coordinating Air Use Management (NESCAUM), Massachusetts exchanges air pollution control information and coordinates its regulatory activities with neighboring States. NESCAUM objectives include development of uniform air quality evaluation techniques, study of interstate compacts and legislation, interstate cooperation to identify actual and potential multi-state air pollution problems and region-wide interchange of air quality data. NESCAUM is composed of air pollution control staff members from States which are jointly involved in Interstate Air Quality Control Regions, and reports directly to the New England Governor's Conference. The New England Interstate Radiological Health Compact prescribes similar procedures for air pollution problems resulting from the release of nuclear contaminants.

B. INTRASTATE

Massachusetts law requires all State agencies to cooperate in air pollution control matters and to comply with air pollution control regulations. The cooperation and assistance of State departments and agencies is further assured by the good offices of the Governor. In addition to the Department of Public Health, the Departments of Public Works, Public Safety and Natural Resources also have air pollution control responsibilities.

At present, several municipal air pollution control programs are in effect in Massachusetts. However, it is not expected that these programs will be continued on a long-term basis. Instead Massachusetts expects to make increased use of regional air pollution control programs implemented through six regional air pollution control districts under the direction of the Bureau of Air Use Management within the Massachusetts Department of Public Health

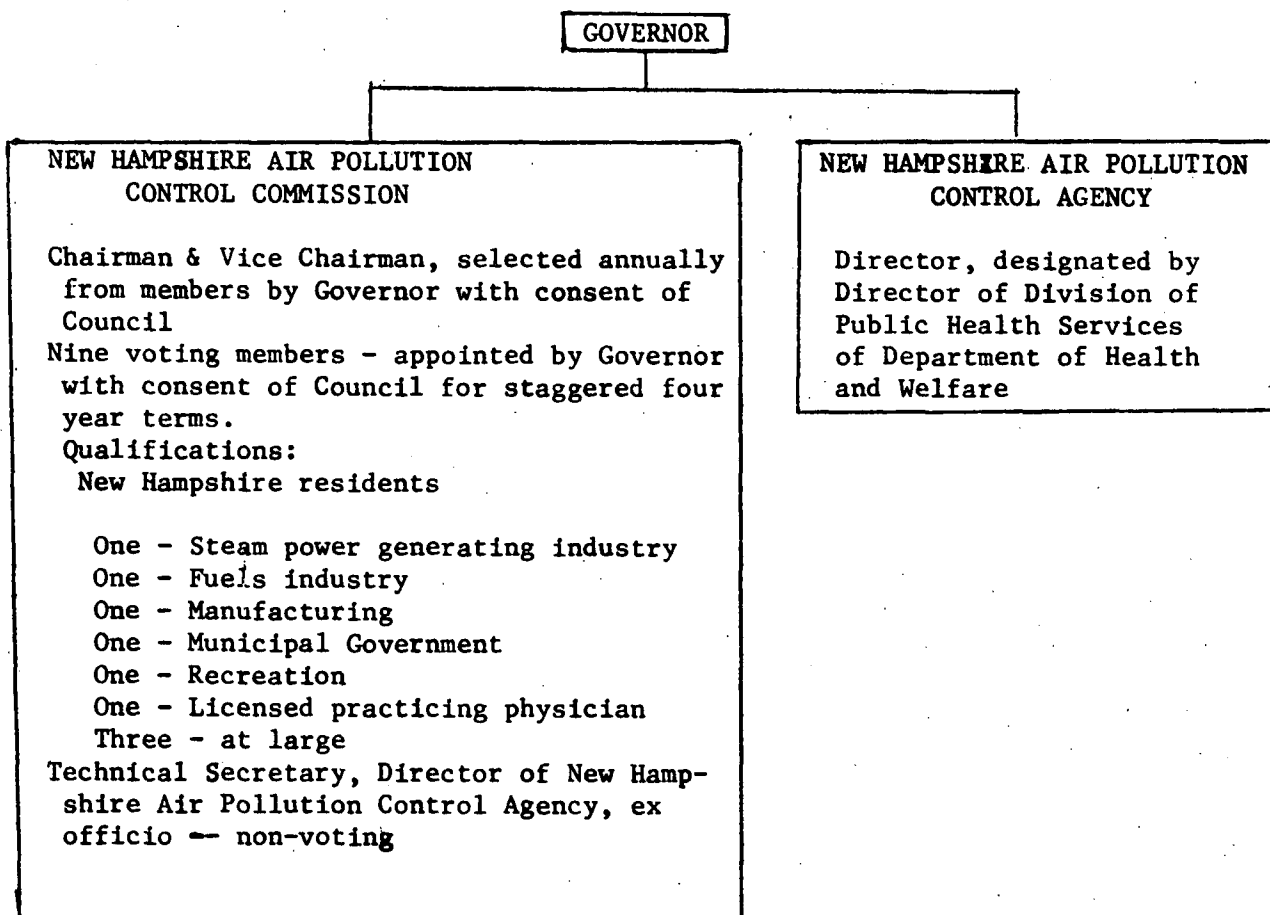

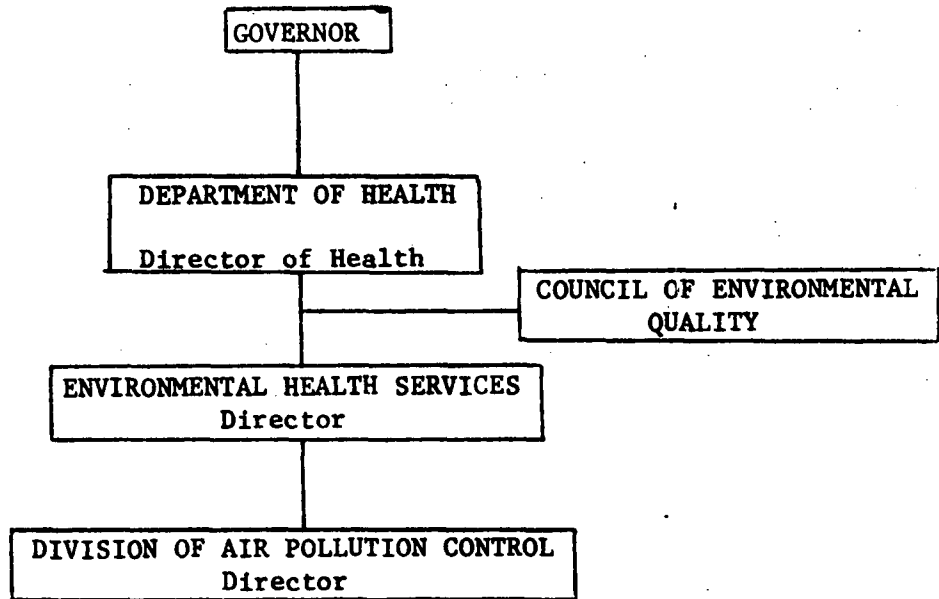

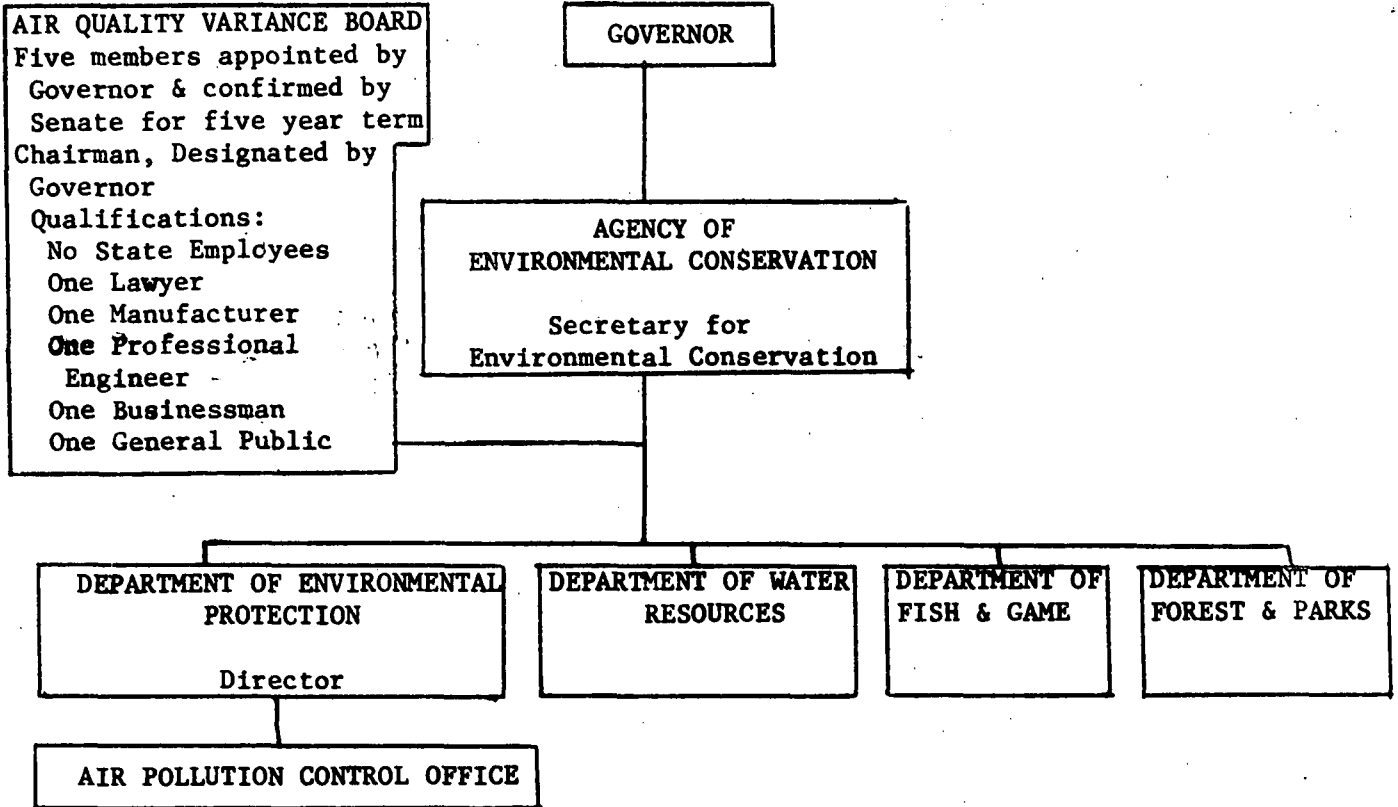

Other State agencies assist the Agency of Environmental Conservation to implement a comprehensive air pollution control program by cooperating in inspection and enforcement activities.

Vermont provides for a coordinated, state-wide air pollution control program in which responsibility is shared by the State and local governments. The State encourages local governments to handle air pollution problems within their respective jurisdictions and by compact on a cooperative basis and provides technical and consultative assistance. Subject to State approval and continuing State surveillance, municipalities may establish, administer and enforce local air pollution control ordinances and programs compatible with or more strict or extensive than State law and regulations. Upon request from an approved local air pollution control authority, the State may assume and retain jurisdiction over certain classes of air contaminant sources.

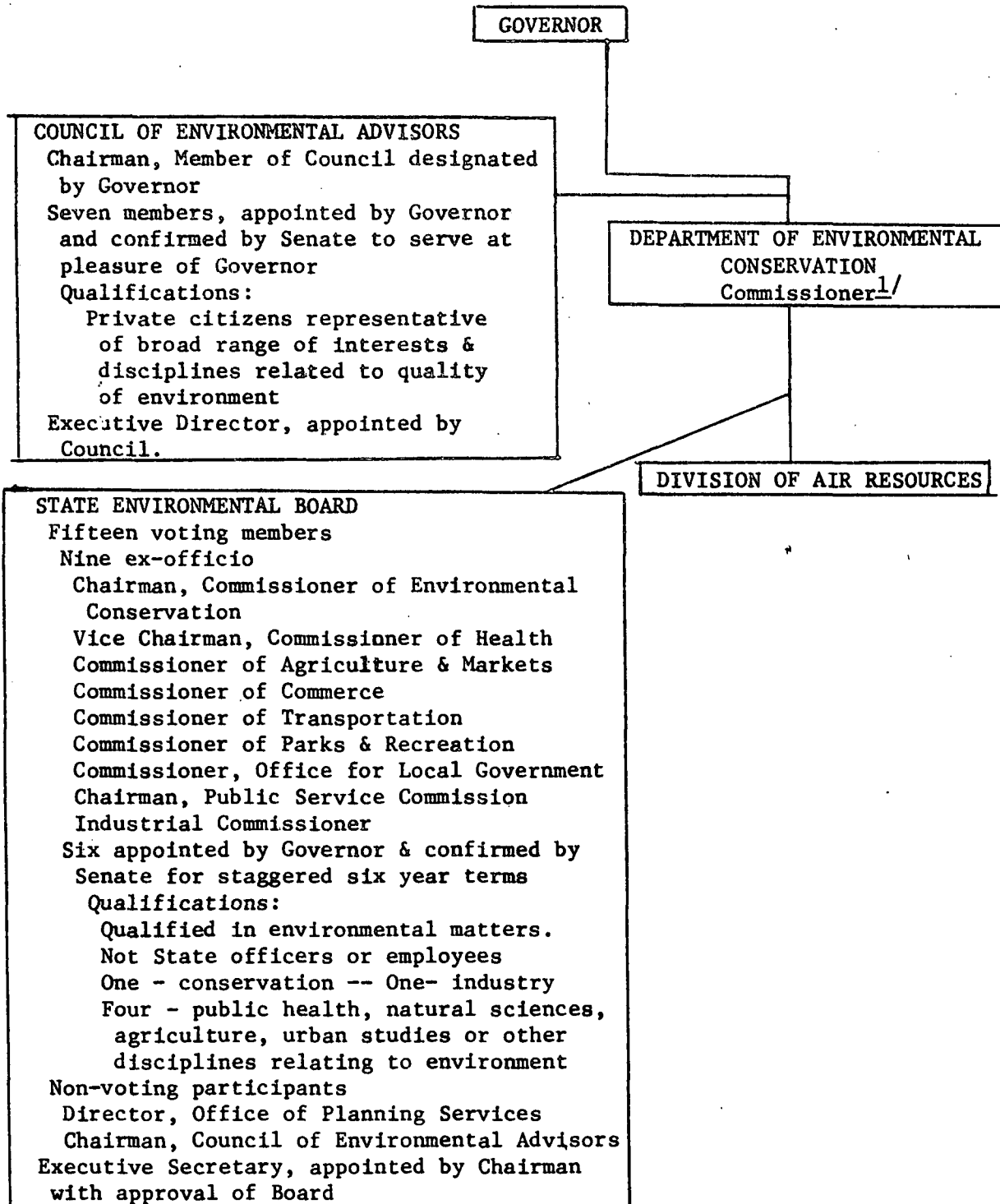

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

The New York Department of Environmental Conservation consults and cooperates with other State agencies, Federal agencies, other states, interstate and international agencies, interested persons and groups. New York furnishes air quality control information to Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Vermont and the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, Canada.

New York, New Jersey, and Connecticut participate in the Interstate Sanitation Commission. The Commission collects air pollution data, conducts field surveys and inspections, makes complaint referrals and coordinates planning and emergency episode activities.

B. INTRASTATE

In New York, responsibility for air pollution control is shared by the State, which provides overall guidance and direction, and regional and local agencies. Local agencies may obtain advice and financial assistance from the State. State funds may be withheld if local programs are inadequate or unsatisfactory. Local governments may adopt and enforce local ordinances and regulations consistent with State laws and regulations.

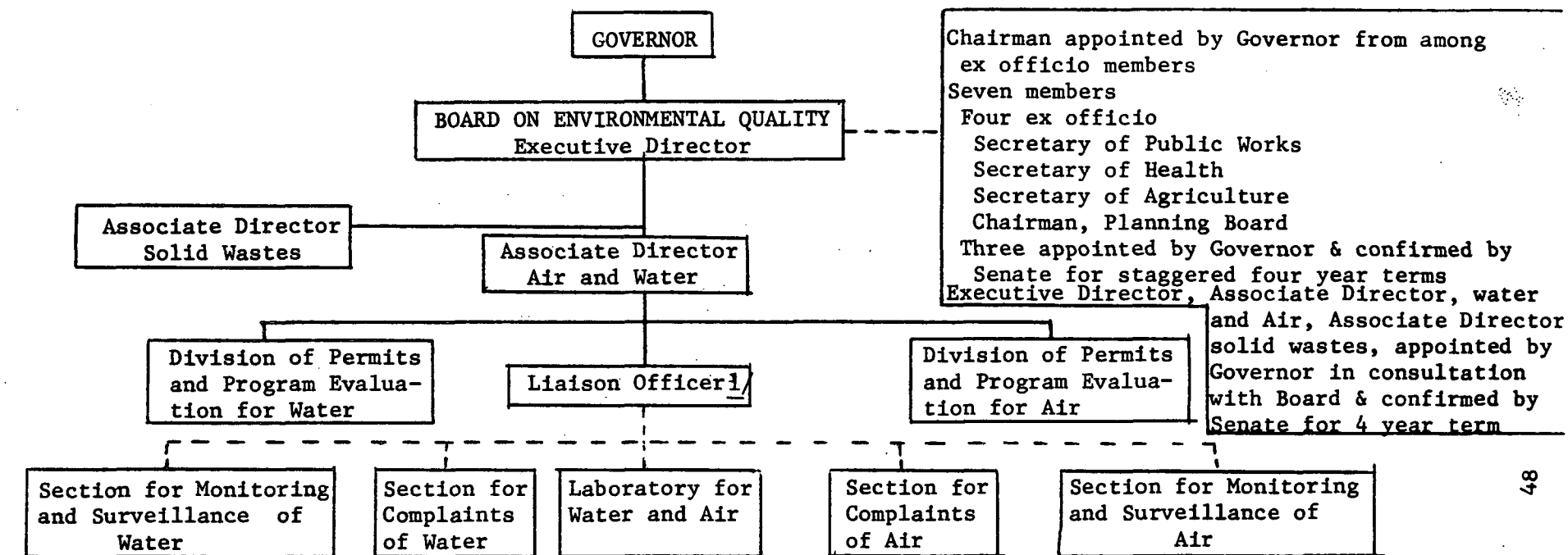

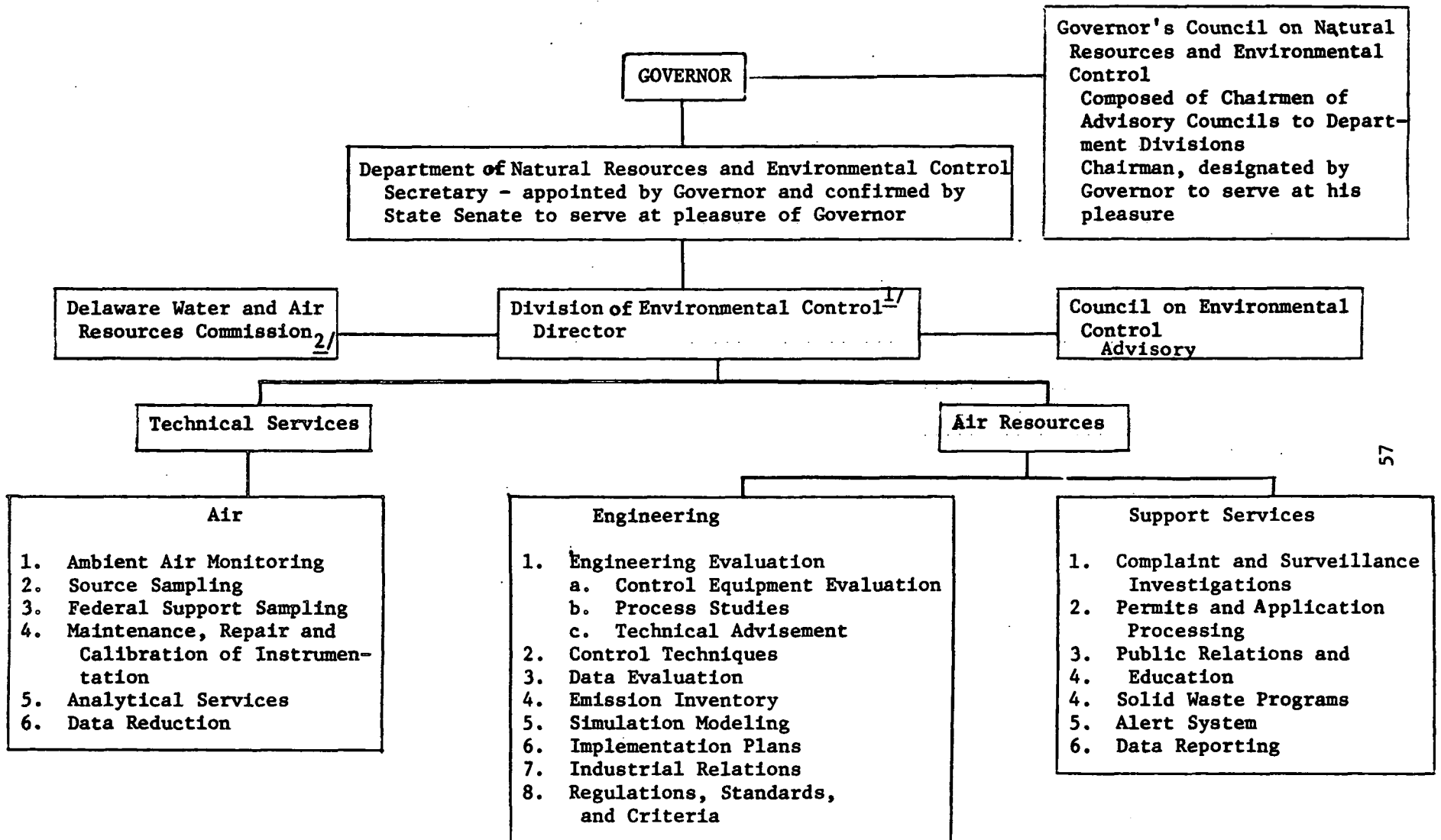

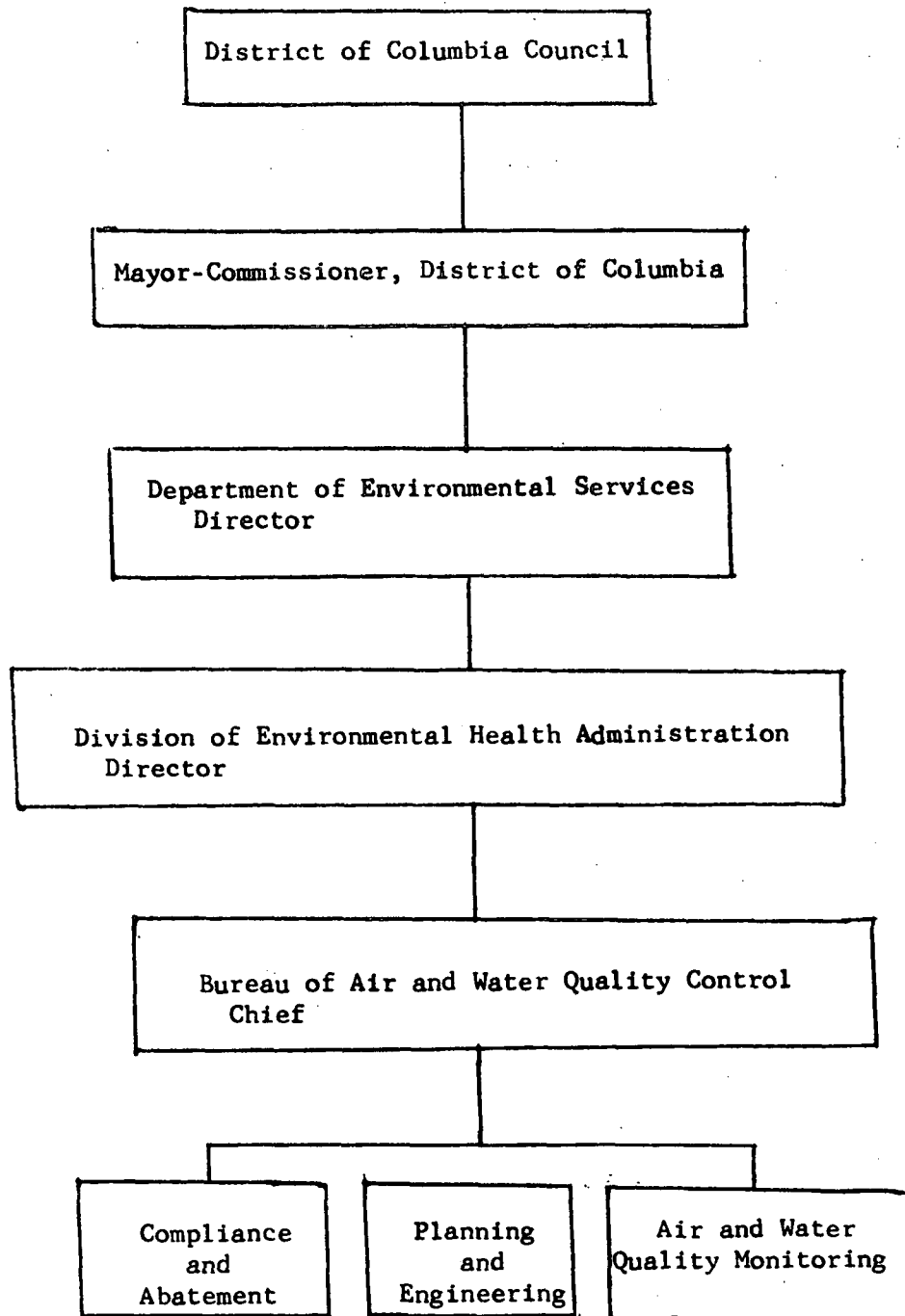

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

The Mayor-Commissioner of the District of Columbia advises, consults, cooperates and enters into agreements for the prevention and control of air pollution with governments, agencies and political subdivisions of adjacent States, and with interstate or regional agencies representing those States and political subdivisions. The District of Columbia Government provides air pollution control agencies of other States with information on factors which may affect air quality in the National Capital Interstate Air Quality Control Region.

Air Quality Planning Committee

The "Administrative Agreement Covering Air Quality Planning for the National Capital Interstate Air Quality Control Region" entered into by Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia ^{1/} established an Air Quality Planning Committee with broad authority to coordinate the interjurisdictional planning aspects of air pollution control activities of the participants and to further cooperation among them. The Committee recommends air quality standards, enters into contracts and accepts grants, coordinates interjurisdictional monitoring activities, disseminates information, receives complaints, and makes reports. 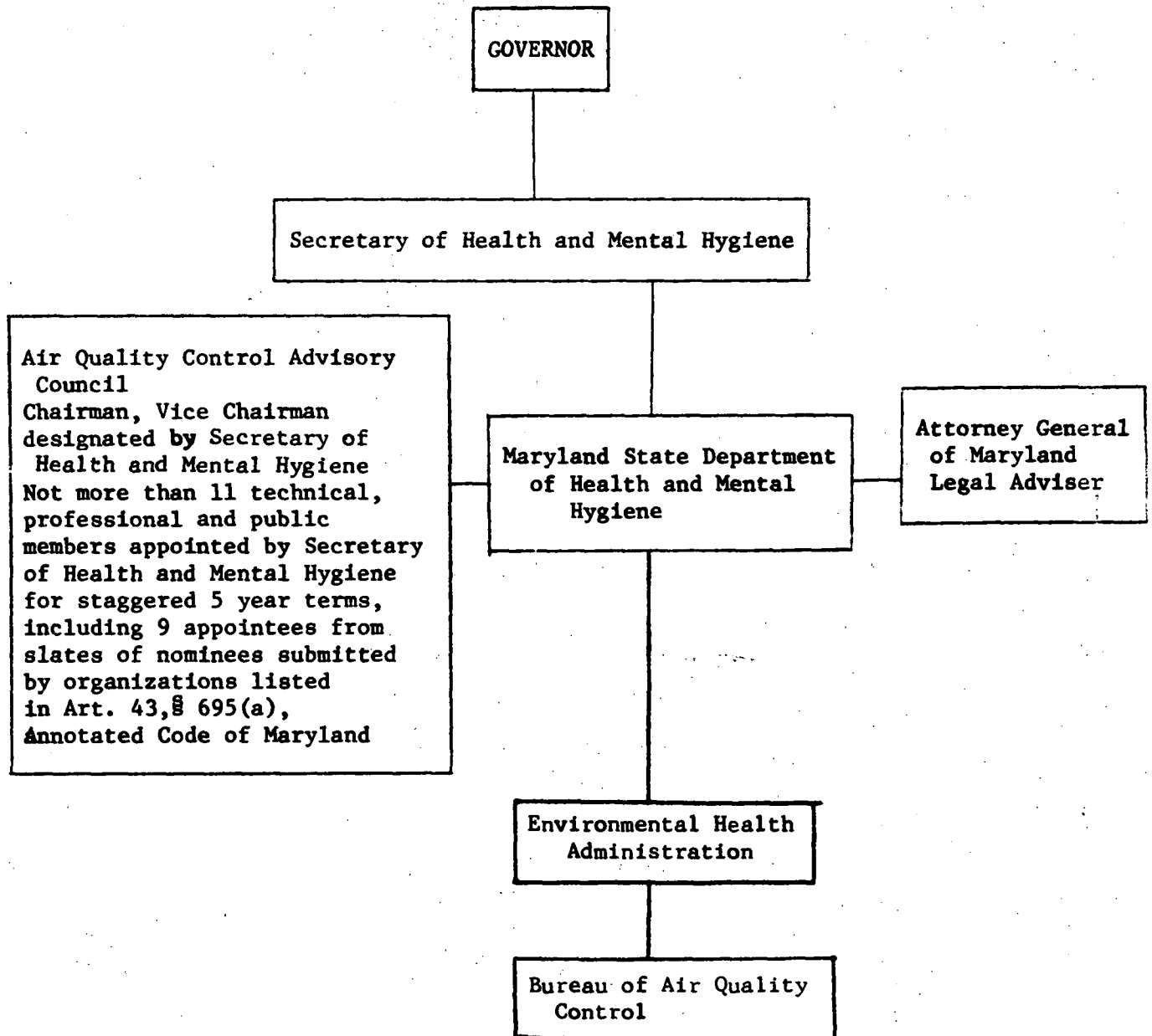

Federally-owned installations. The State supports and provides leadership in the development of local programs and to the extent possible uses local facilities and services to enforce State regulations. Variations in the complementary relationships which have been developed for each State-county enforcement interface reflect differences in the size and capabilities of local programs. Local governments are empowered to enact and enforce local air pollution control laws and regulations consistent with and not less stringent than the State law. Where State and local requirements are both applicable to the same subject, the more stringent requirements prevail.

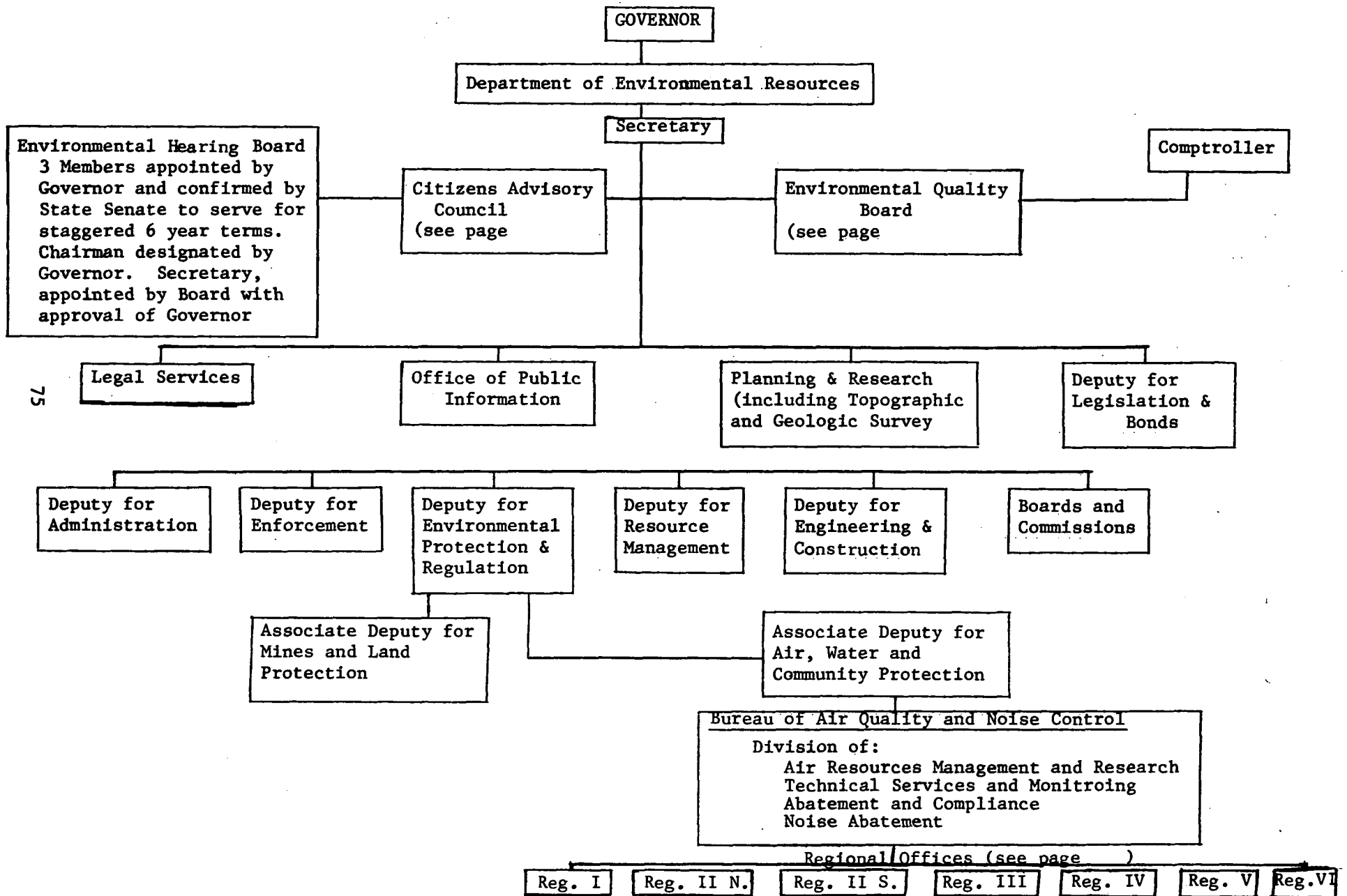

The Delaware, New Jersey, Pennsylvania Interstate Cooperative Agreement on air pollution establishes a framework for interstate cooperation within the Metropolitan Philadelphia Interstate Air Quality Control Region which includes 11 counties in three States. In Pennsylvania, responsibility for air pollution control is shared between the State and local governments. The latter are encouraged to assume full responsibility for air pollution control within their jurisdictions and may enact and enforce local air pollution control ordinances and regulations which do not conflict with State laws and regulations. Local governments whose air pollution control agencies and programs have been approved by the State are relieved from the application of State air pollution control procedures within their boundaries except insofar as the effects of local air contaminant sources extend beyond those boundaries. Local programs are subject to continuing State surveillance and if found inadequate to reassertion of State enforcement authority.

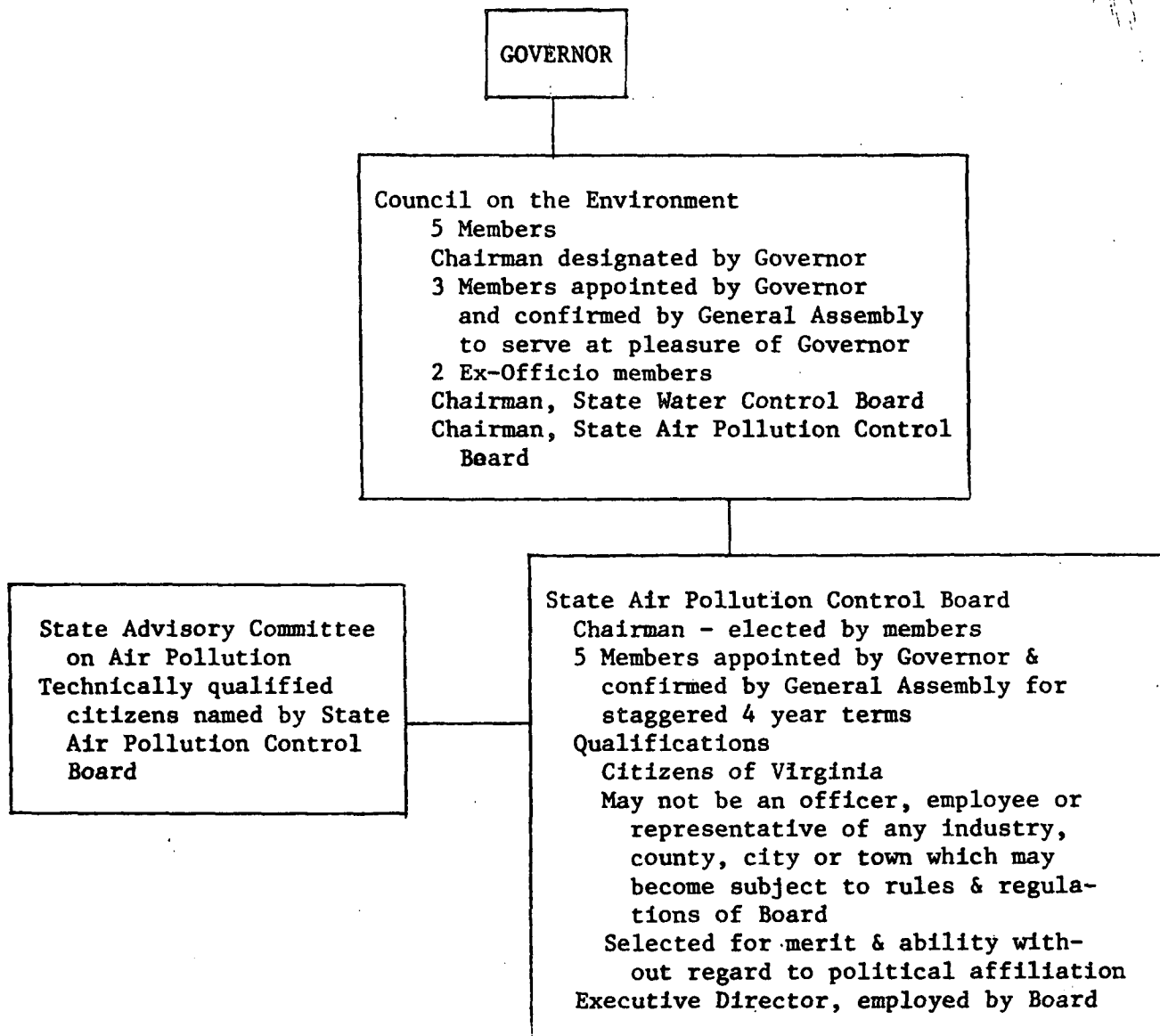

Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Commission (WMATC)

WMATC, created by interstate compact between Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia and approved by Congress, October 9, 1962, has broad authority to regulate and improve transit and to alleviate traffic congestion within the Metropolitan District.

B. INTRASTATE

In Virginia, the State Air Pollution Control Board has overall responsibility for air pollution control throughout the State. The Board may establish local air pollution control districts with authority within their respective localities to observe compliance with State air pollution rules and regulations and to report instances of non-compliance to the State Board. Subject to State Board approval, localities may adopt and enforce local ordinances as stringent as State regulations. Where State and more stringent local regulations conflict, the latter prevail.

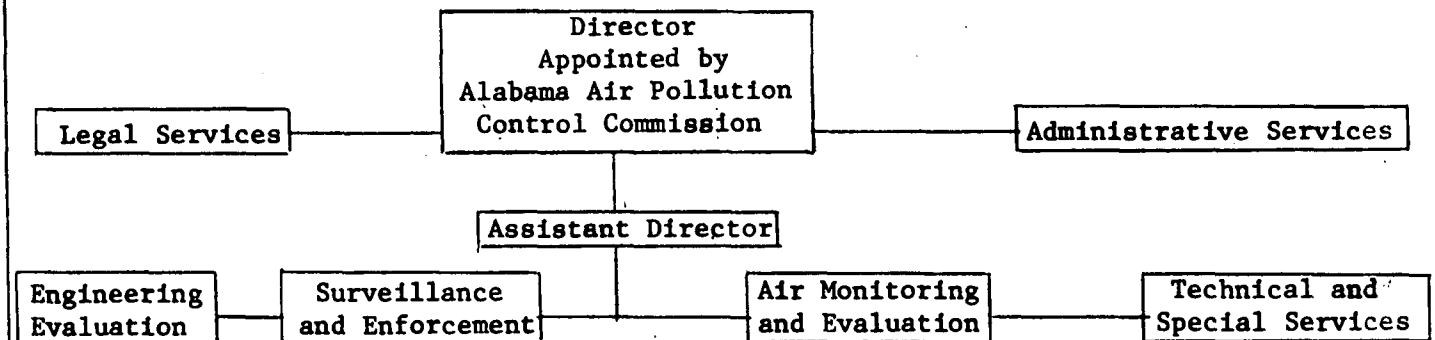

Except as specifically provided in the Alabama Air Pollution Control Act of 1971, the State has preempted the field of air pollution control in Alabama. Where not preempted, State and local air pollution control authorities exercise concurrent jurisdiction. Under § 15 of the Act, municipalities and counties are authorized to establish, administer, and enforce local air pollution control programs consistent with or more strict than the State program. The Alabama Air Pollution Control Commission maintains surveillance over local programs and may preempt local enforcement authority.

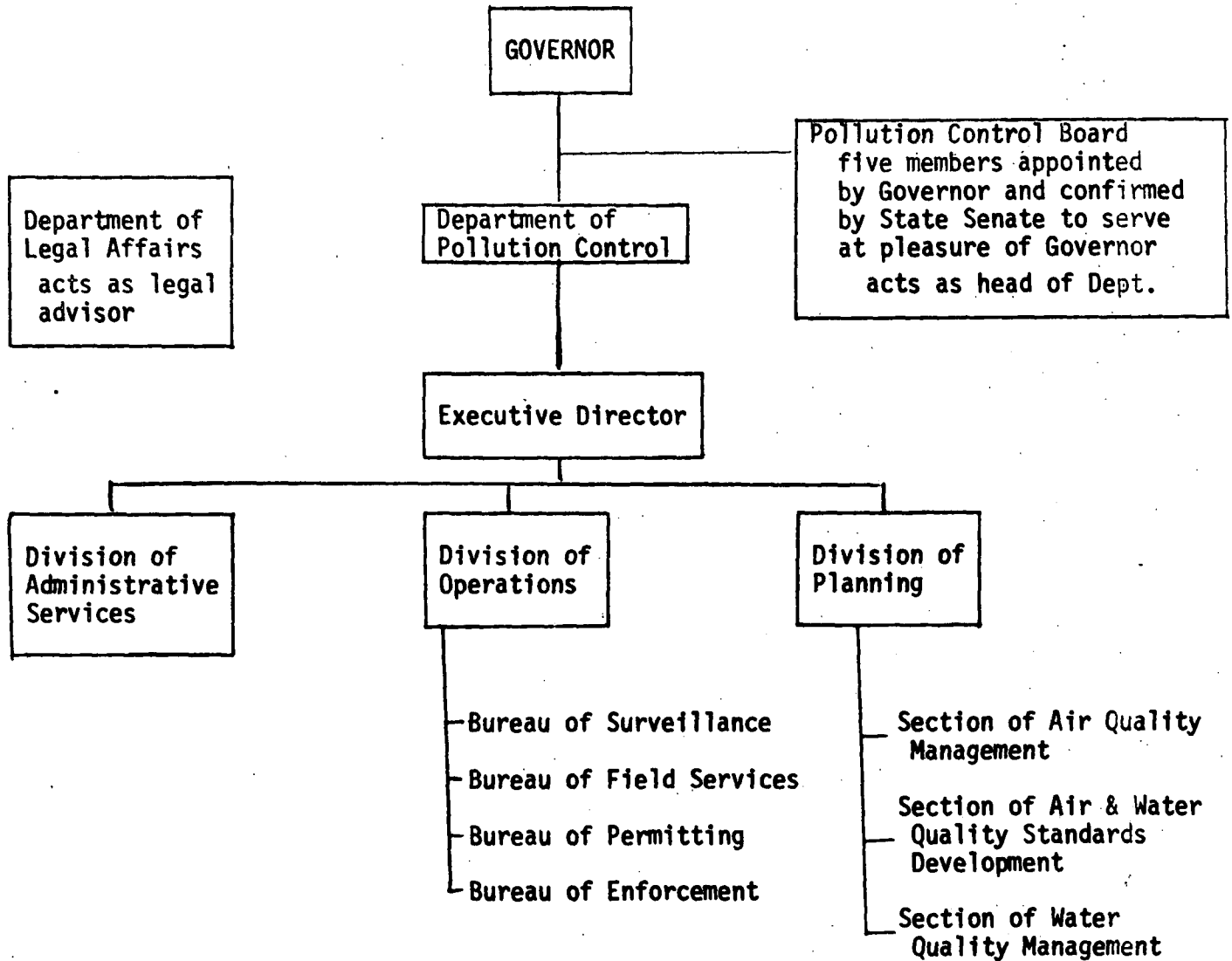

The Department of Pollution Control advises, consults, cooperates and enters into agreements with other State agencies, Federal agencies, other States, interstate agencies, local governments, groups and industries. The Department of Pollution Control cooperates with the Division of Forestry of the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services in implementing open burning rules, and with the Department of Transportation to advance mass rapid transit projects and secure revision of traffic patterns.

B. INTRASTATE

The Florida Air and Water Pollution Control Act provides for a coordinated statewide air pollution control program in which local and regional air pollution control programs are to be supported to the extent practicable. Under § 403.182 of the Act, municipalities and counties are authorized, with Department approval, to establish, administer and enforce local air pollution control programs compatible with or more strict than the State program.

The Department of Pollution Control provides technical and consultative assistance to local governments, maintains surveillance over local programs and may assert State control if the local program is inadequate. The Department may also assume and retain jurisdiction over certain classes of contaminant sources. II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

North Carolina routinely exchanges information with the air pollution control agencies of Georgia, South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia and cooperates with these agencies in the development of emergency episode procedures. The information exchanged includes air quality, emission inventory, and source construction data, regulations and standards.

The North Carolina Board of Water and Air Resources, with the approval of the Governor, may consult with qualified representatives of adjoining States regarding the establishment of air pollution control regulations of mutual interest. These regulations become binding upon approval by the General Assembly of North Carolina.

B. INTRASTATE

North Carolina encourages local governments to handle air pollution problems within their respective jurisdictions and authorizes the State Board of Water and Air Resources to provide local governments with technical and consultative assistance. Pursuant to § 143-215.3(11) of the North Carolina Water and Air Resources Act, counties and municipalities are authorized to establish, administer and enforce local or regional air pollution control programs subject to approval, certification and continuing surveillance by the State Board of Water and Air Resources. Local ordinances, regulations and standards must be compatible with or more strict than State law, standards and regulations. Where local programs are inadequate, the State may reassert control. The State may also assume and retain jurisdiction over certain classes of contaminant sources. At present, the State regulates the following air contaminant sources: public utility power plants, motor vehicles, chemical manufacturing plants and pulp and paper plants.

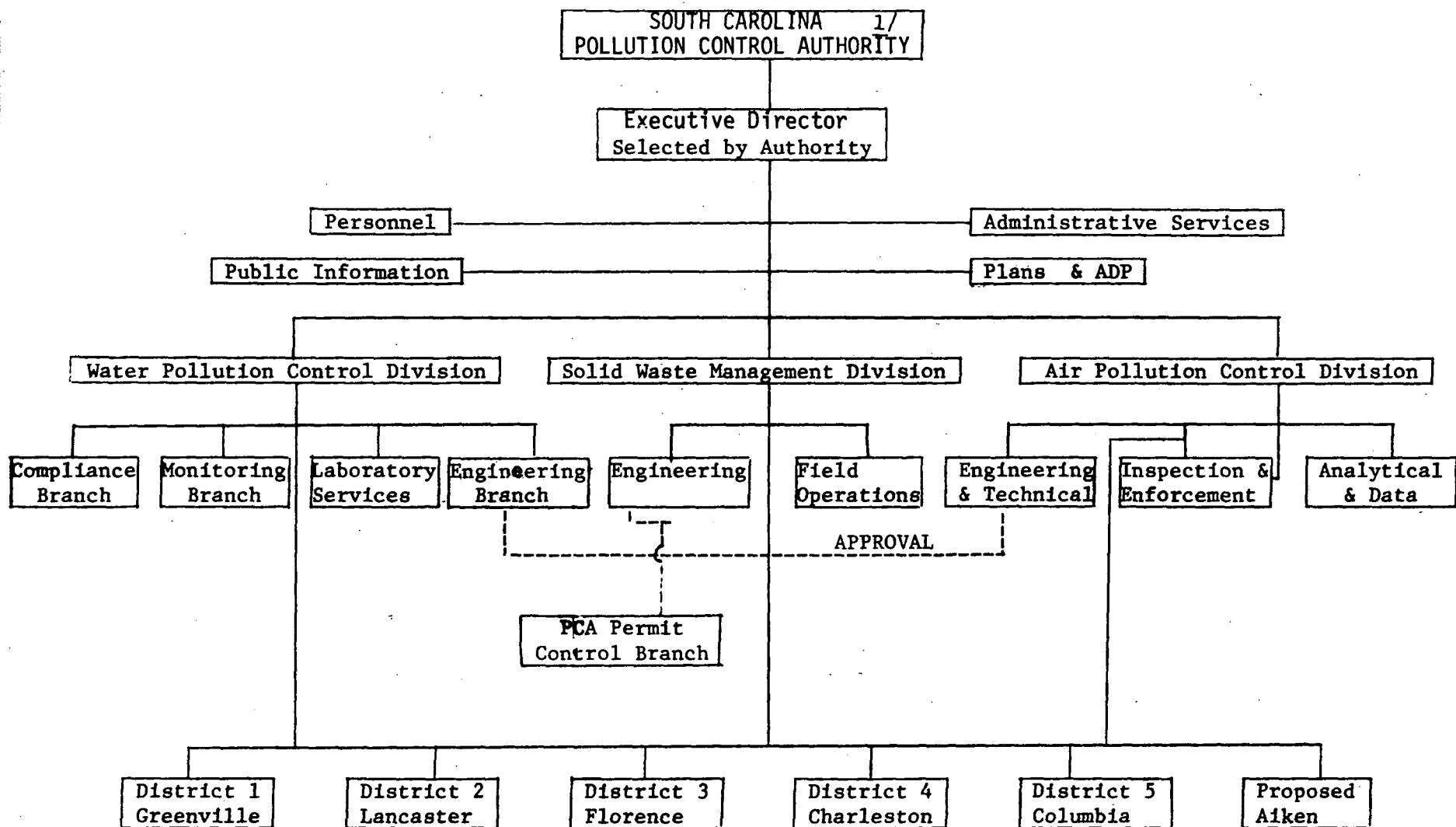

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

The South Carolina Pollution Control Authority cooperates with other State agencies, Federal agencies and other States with respect to pollution control matters and the formulation of interstate pollution control compacts or agreements. The Authority exchanges information and data on regulations, standards, ambient air quality and new sources with air pollution control agencies in other States (Georgia and North Carolina).

B. INTRASTATE

The South Carolina Pollution Control Agency is responsible for air pollution control throughout the State. However, counties are authorized, subject to approval and periodic review by the South Carolina Pollution Control Authority, to establish, administer and enforce local air pollution control programs which comply with State standards and procedures.

TENNESSEE B. INTRASTATE

In Tennessee, responsibility for air pollution control is shared between the State and local governments. The latter are encouraged to handle air pollution problems within their respective jurisdictions and may request technical assistance from the Tennessee Department of Public Health. The Tennessee Air Pollution Control Board issues certificates of exemption to local governments which have enacted and are able to enforce local air pollution control ordinances and regulations consistent with, and not less stringent than, State law and regulations. Pursuant to these certificates, which are issued subject to the preemptive power of the State and to periodic State review, local governments are exempt from the requirements of State law and regulations and exercise exclusive responsibility for air pollution control within their jurisdictions.

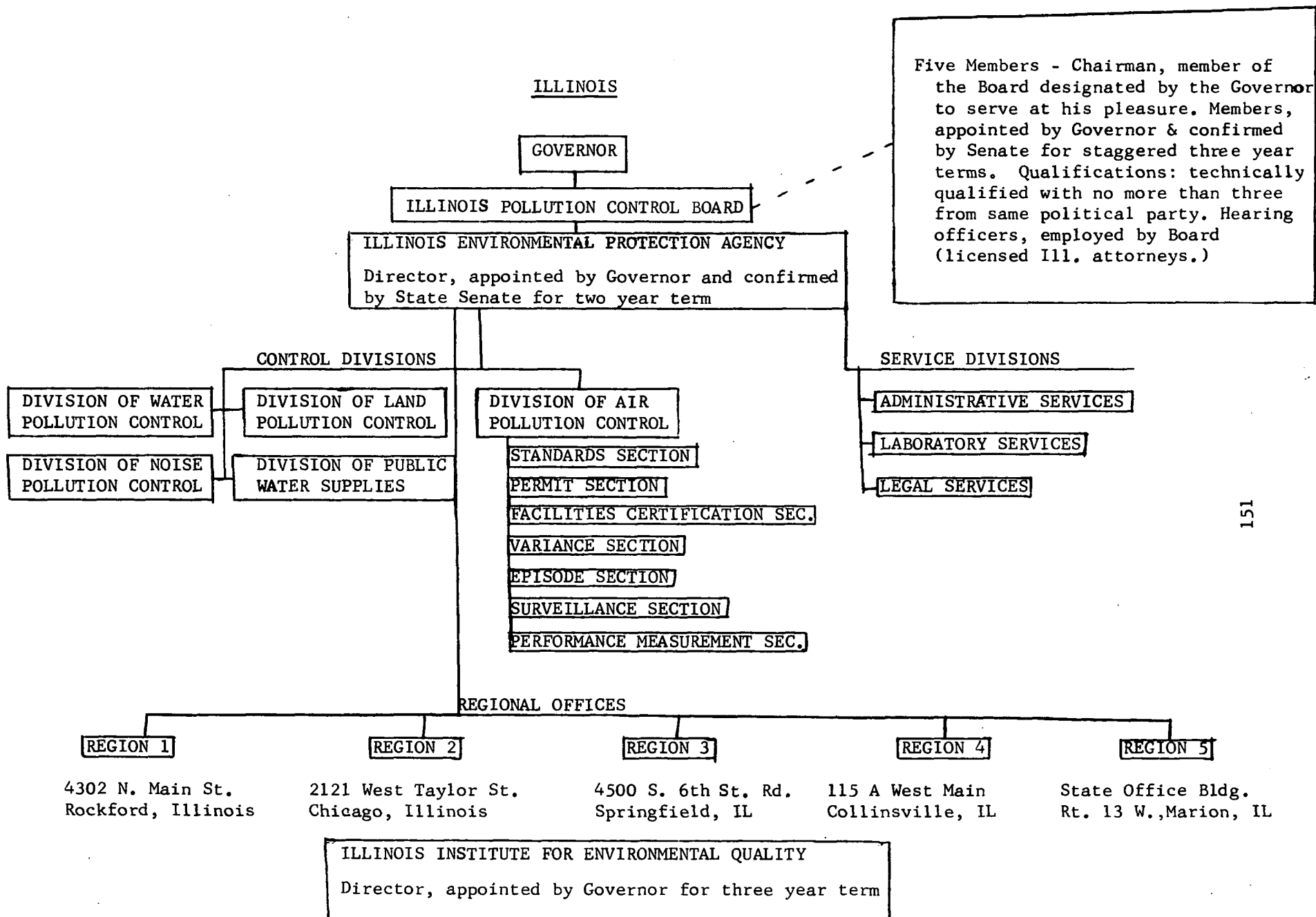

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

Illinois cooperates fully with other States and with the United States in protecting the environment. The Illinois Environmental Protection Agency represents Illinois in all interstate compact matters or other governmental arrangements relating to environmental protection.

Illinois, Kentucky and Missouri have established a joint committee through which State air pollution control agencies can exchange information and data of common interest, coordinate their regulatory efforts and develop joint emergency procedures. The information exchanged includes laws, ordinances, regulations, proposed ambient air quality and emission standards, air quality monitoring and source emission data and complaint referrals.

A. INTERSTATE (cont.)

The Illinois Institute for Environmental Quality cooperates with the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency, the Illinois Pollution Control Board, the Illinois State Geological Survey, the Illinois State Natural History Survey, the Illinois State Water Survey and with other Federal or State research agencies in selecting study projects. The Institute also develops interdisciplinary environmental education programs in cooperation with the Illinois Board of Higher Education and educational institutions and sponsors annual environmental quality conferences.

All State agencies are required to comply with the provisions of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act and the regulations adopted thereunder. State agencies are required to submit annual environmental compliance reports and plans for proposed facilities to the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.

B. INTRASTATE

Illinois has established a unified state-wide environmental protection program for which the State and local governments have concurrent responsibility. The State encourages and assists local governments to adopt and implement environmental protection programs consistent with the Illinois Environmental Protection Act. State and local law enforcement officers are authorized to enforce the Illinois Environmental Protection Act and regulations adopted thereunder. Municipalities and sanitary districts are required by law to comply with abatement orders issued by the Illinois Pollution Control Board or the courts.

INDIANA

In Indiana, organization of environmental development and control activities at the State level is in a process of transition as a result of the enactment of the Environmental Management Act, approved and effective February 16, 1972. With respect to existing State organizations, this act provides in part as follows:

1. The Air Pollution Control Board as now established is continued.
2. The powers and duties of the Air Pollution Control Board are not affected ". . .except as specifically altered or changed in. . . .or pursuant to. . ." the Environmental Management Act.
3. The Air Pollution Control Board shall continue to exercise all powers and perform all duties now imposed on it in the same manner as prior to the enactment of the Environmental Management Act, except as its powers and duties are modified by the Act.
4. Notwithstanding any provision of the Environmental Management Act, whenever a duty was imposed on or a power granted to the Air Pollution Control Board under provisions of laws existing prior to the Environmental Management Act, then such duty or power shall be exercised by the Air Pollution Control Board.
5. The Air Pollution Control Board is designated as the State air pollution control agency for all purposes of the Federal Clean Air Act, P.L. 88-206, approved December 17, 1963, as amended. The Indiana Environmental Management Board and the Air Pollution Control Board are authorized to take all action necessary to secure to the State the benefits of the Federal Clean Air Act.
6. The Indiana Environmental Management Board may assign to either the Air Pollution Control Board or the Stream Pollution Control Board "the making of rules, regulations and standards in any area not now provided for by law,"(emphasis supplied) or the Indiana Environmental Management "[B]oard may directly exercise such power until such time as a specific agency for the exercise thereof may be created."

7. The Environmental Management Act prescribes the procedure whereby powers and duties vested in the State Board of Health under the Indiana Air Pollution Control Act and staff of the State Board of Health may be transferred to the Indiana Environmental Management Board. The instrument of transfer is "a written agreement of transfer, ratified by resolution of both boards and approved by the Governor." Absent formal transfer pursuant to Chapter 6, Sections 1 and 2 of the Indiana Environmental Management Act, the Act does not affect the powers, duties and authority of the Indiana State Board of Health in any manner.

B. INTRASTATE

Indiana has provided for a comprehensive, coordinated long-term statewide environmental development and control program designed to provide for the most beneficial use of State resources and to preserve, protect and enhance the quality of the environment. The State and local governments share responsibility for carrying out this program. The Indiana Environmental Management Board encourages and assists local governments to establish standards and develop programs and facilities for air pollution control which comply with minimum State requirements or standards. After public hearing the Board may order local governments to form regional air pollution control districts. All State and local law enforcement officers are authorized to enforce the Indiana Environmental Management Act and regulations adopted thereunder. 163

All State agencies are required to report to the Indiana Environmental Management Board, for purposes of review and coordination, any plans or activities which may affect the environment of the State.

The State Board of Health also assists local governments on air pollution matters and encourages local governments to handle air pollution problems within their respective jurisdictions. Local governments may enact and enforce local air pollution control ordinances consistent with or more strict than State law. Where local enforcement is inadequate the Air Pollution Control Board may take appropriate action to enforce applicable provisions of State law.

B. INTRASTATE

In Michigan, responsibility for air pollution control is shared between the State and local agencies. In the exercise of its overall responsibility, the State, in cooperation with local agencies, conducts a comprehensive air pollution control program in all areas of the State except Wayne County where State regulations have been suspended to permit Wayne County to administer and enforce its own program. In other localities, both State and local regulations remain in effect; local regulations may be more strict than State law and regulations. The Air Pollution Control Commission counsels and advises local governments and may preempt local enforcement authority where the latter is inadequate.

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency cooperates with other State agencies, Federal agencies, other States and local governments.

B. INTRASTATE

State agencies are required to cooperate with the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency and may be ordered to do so by the Governor.

The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency has complete responsibility for air pollution control within the State. However, local governments may continue to operate local air pollution control programs as long as those programs are consistent with the State program. Local governments may either enact local legislation or adopt State regulations by reference. Local governments may set stationary source emission regulations more

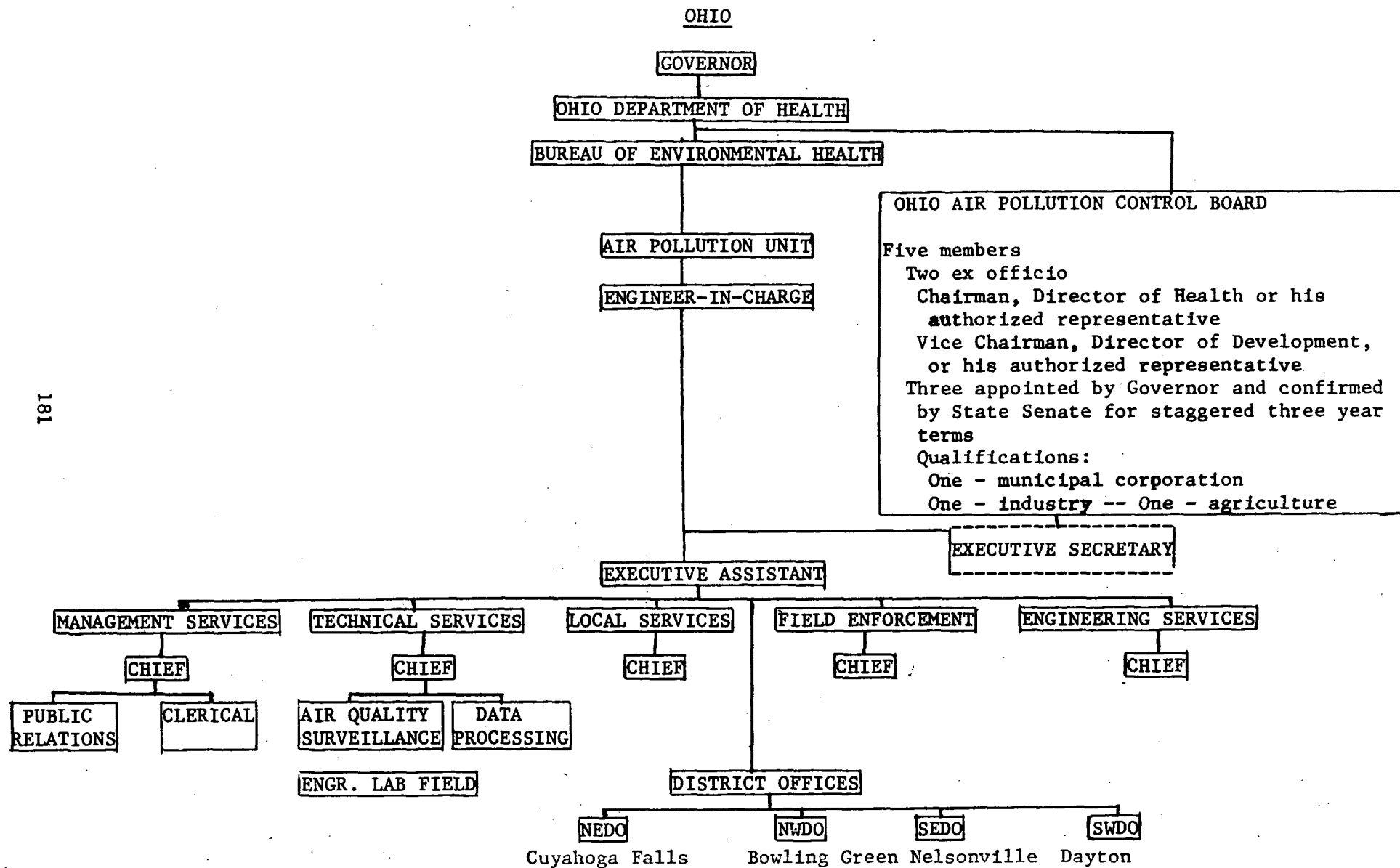

B. INTRASTATE

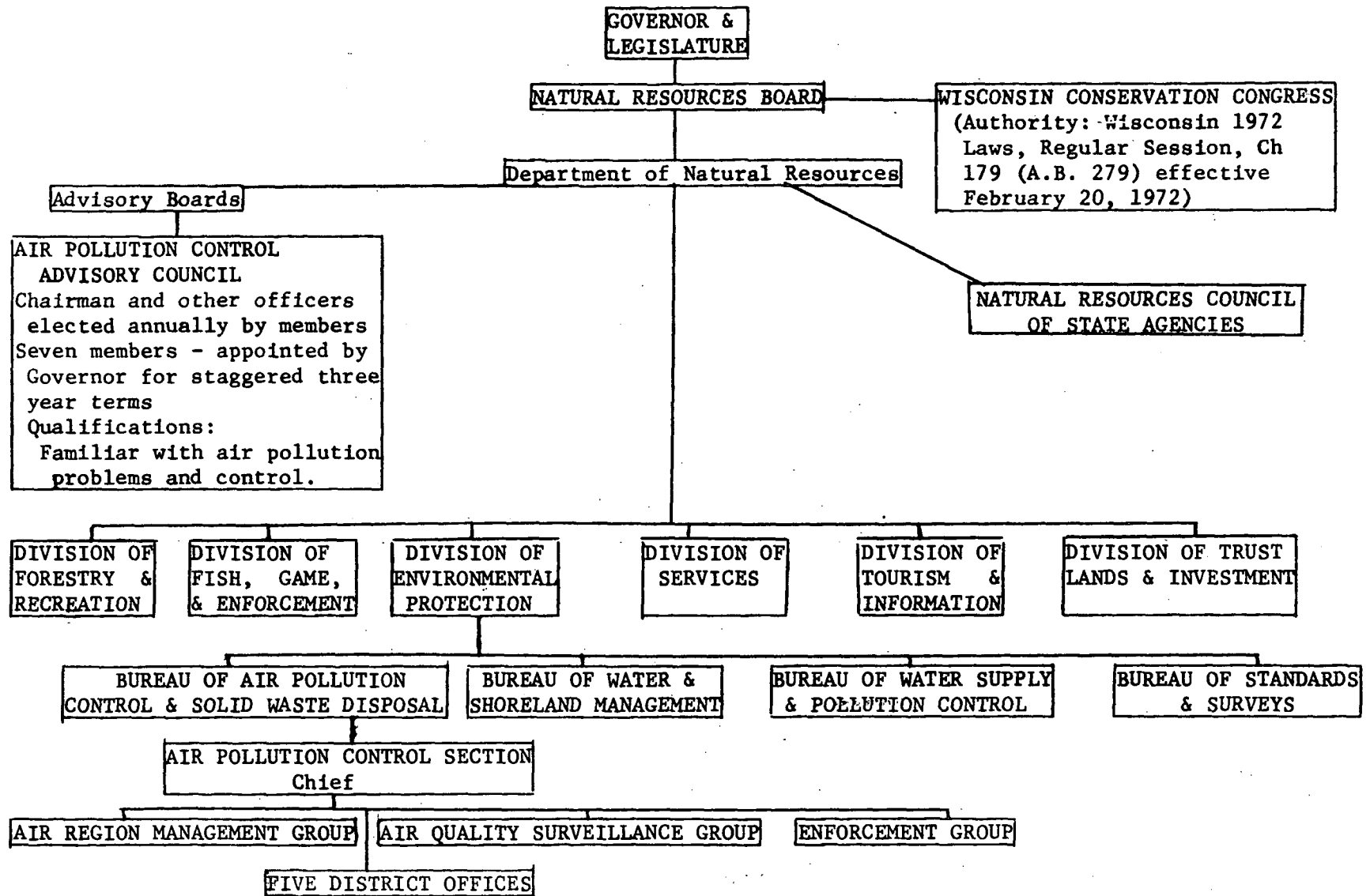

Wisconsin exchanges air quality and emission inventory data with Iowa, Minnesota and Illinois and provides States having air quality control regions in common with Wisconsin with data needed to implement air quality control plans.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources advises, consults, contracts and cooperates with other State agencies, Federal agencies, other States, interstate and interlocal agencies, local governments, industries, interested persons and groups.

B. INTRASTATE

Wisconsin has established a comprehensive, integrated State-wide program to enhance the quality, management and protection of the State's air, land and water resources in which responsibility is shared between the State and local governments. The State encourages local governments to handle air pollution problems within their respective jurisdictions and on a regional basis and provides technical, consultative and training aid and assistance. Subject to State approval, continuing State surveillance and assertion of State regulation and control if the local program is inadequate, counties may establish, administer and enforce local air pollution control programs compatible with and as strict as those imposed by State law and regulations (W.S.A. § 144.41). W.S.A. § 59.07(85) authorizes counties to establish air pollution control departments and to adopt, administer and enforce ordinances and regulations to control emissions. County air pollution control ordinances and regulations supersede existing municipal ordinances and regulations.

In New Mexico, responsibility for air pollution control is shared by the State and local governments. However, the State, acting through the Environmental Improvement Board, retains complete jurisdiction and control for administration and enforcement of the Air Quality Control Act with respect to any act or failure to act by a local government which causes or contributes to air pollution. Local governments may adopt and enforce local ordinances and regulations consistent with and not less strict than State regulations. Local governments are also authorized to administer and enforce the provisions of the New Mexico Air Quality Control Act within their respective jurisdictions.

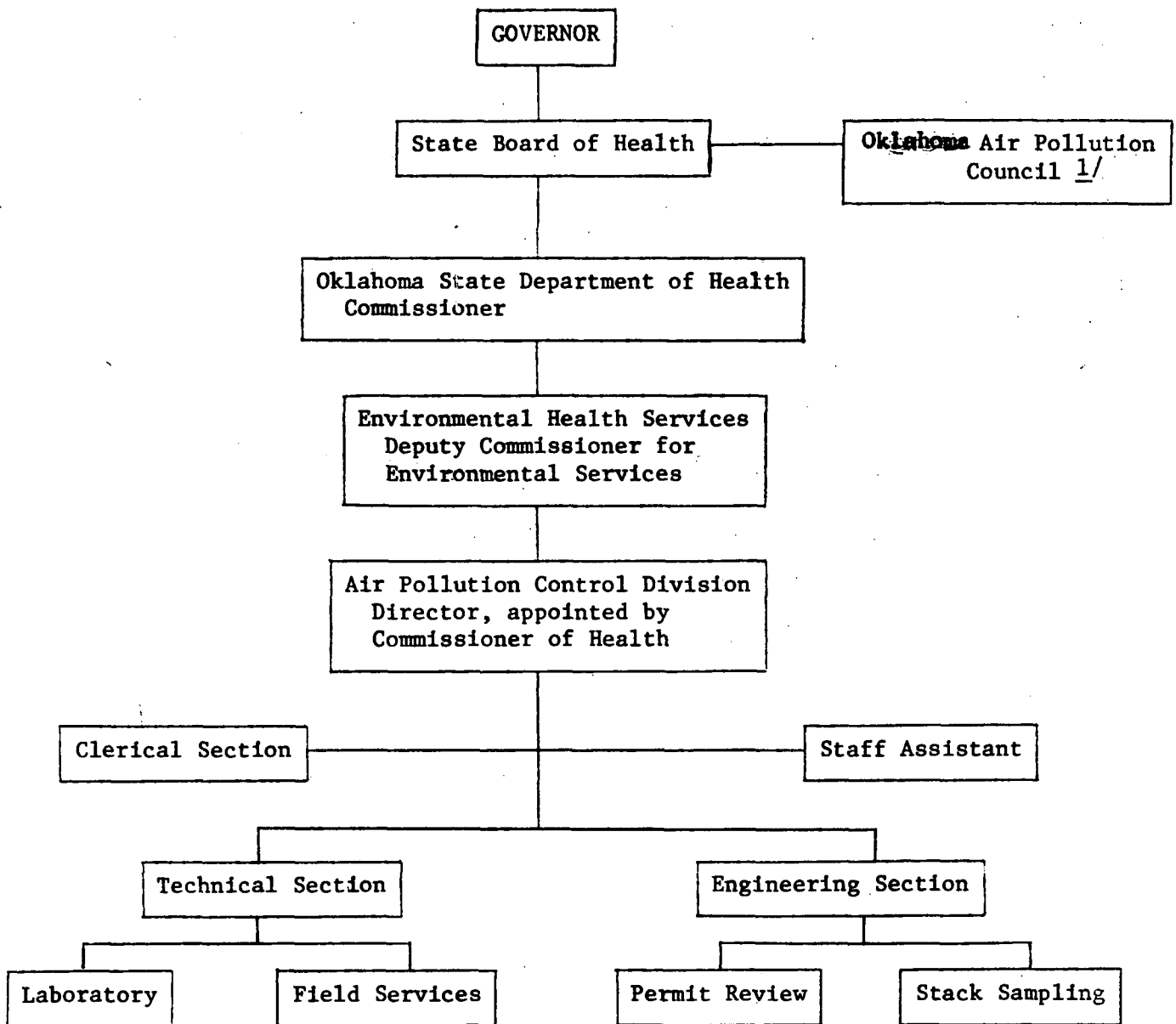

B. INTRASTATE

In Oklahoma, the State has primary responsibility for air pollution control and exercises jurisdiction over air pollution matters concurrently with local governments. The operations of the State Department of Health are carried out at the local level through organized county health units which are considered, under Oklahoma law, as extensions of the State Department of Health. Under State law, County Boards of Health are also empowered to adopt rules and regulations which may be enforced by county health department sanitarians. Local governments may adopt and enforce air pollution control ordinances and codes which do not conflict with and contain provisions as strict as those prescribed by State law and regulations.

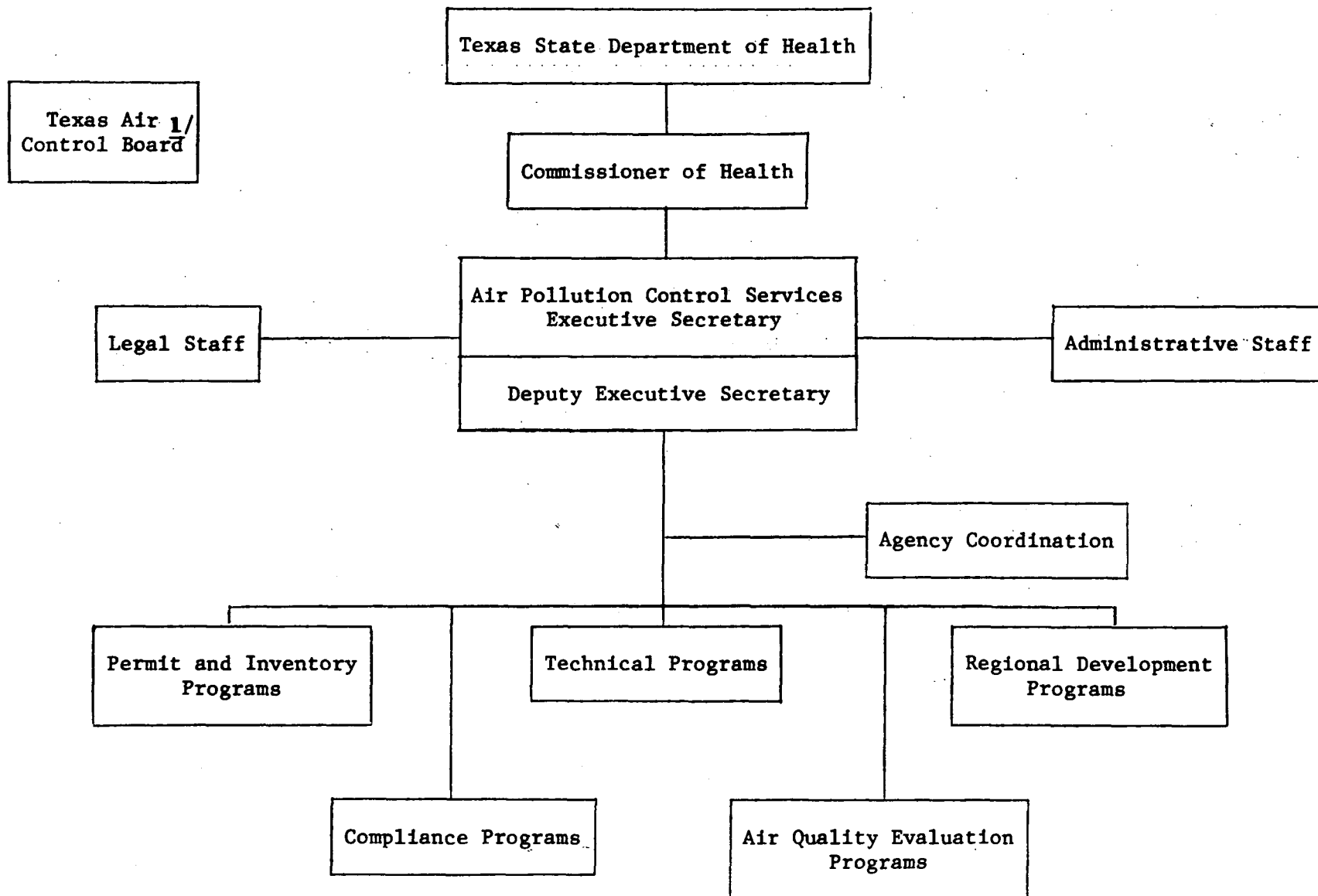

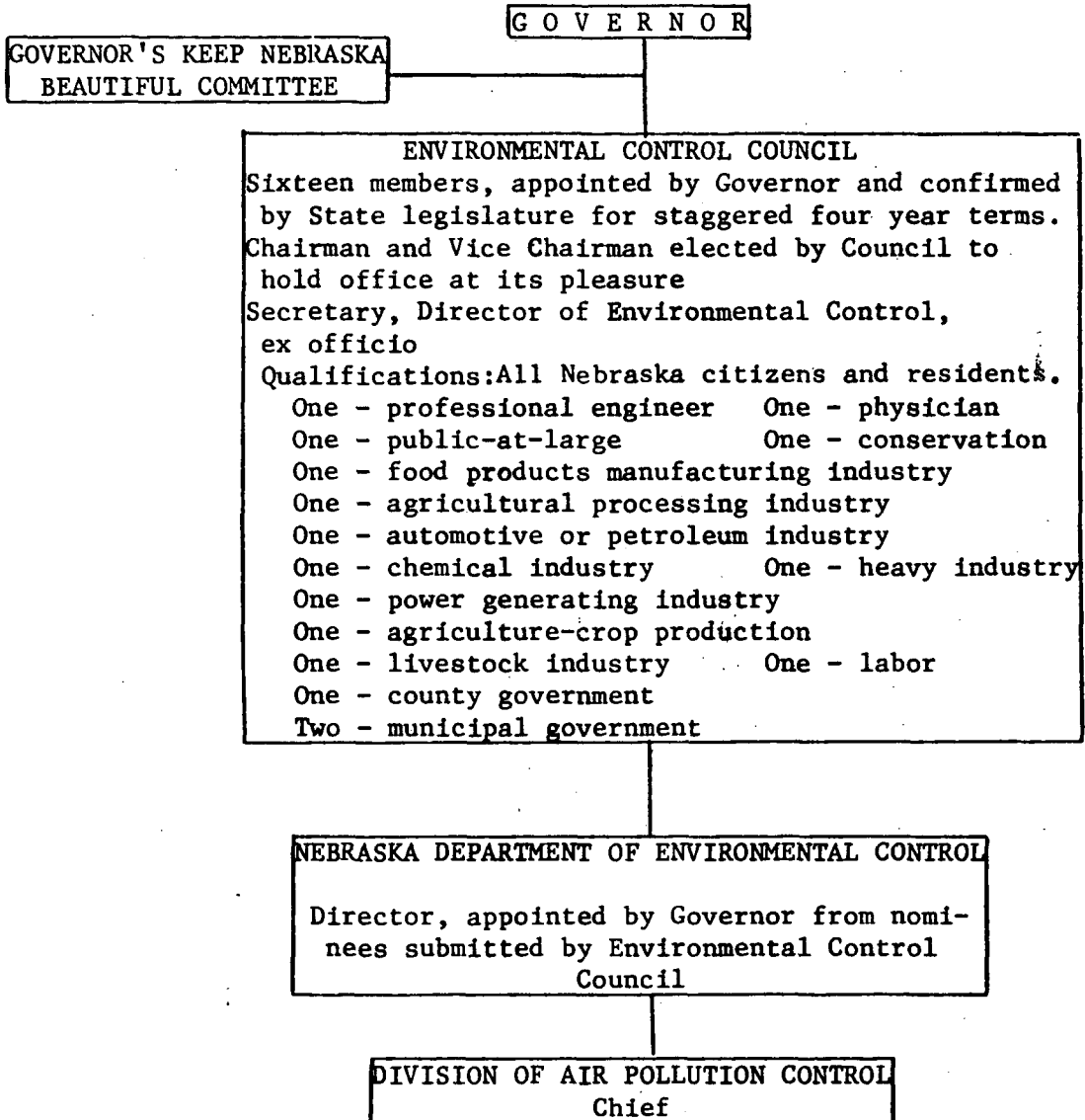

The Department of Environmental Control may, by contract, delegate to local governments with approved programs, authority to enforce State air pollution laws and regulations within specified regions surrounding the jurisdictional area of the local government. Prosecutions commenced under these contracts must be conducted by the Attorney General or County attorneys.

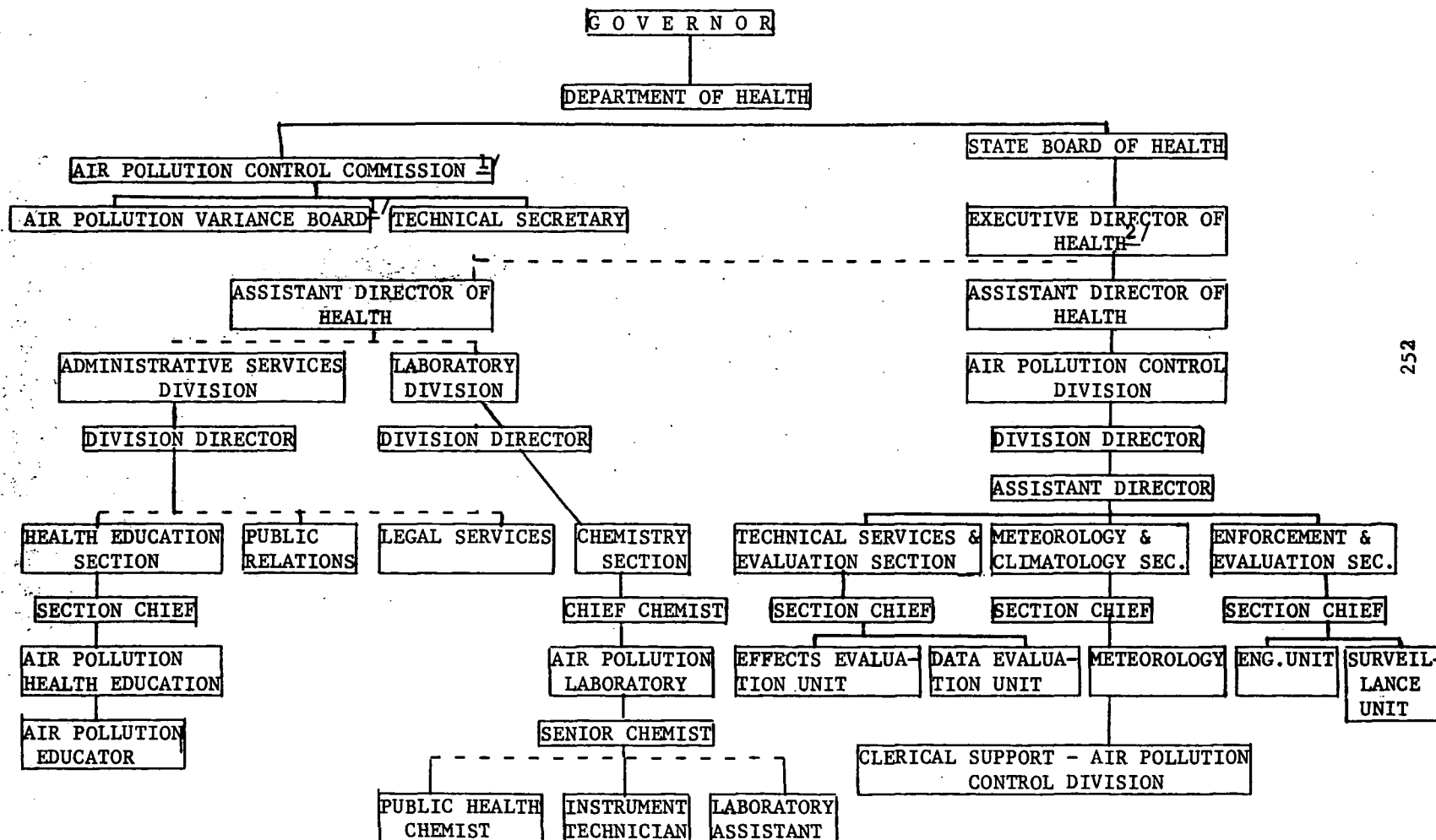

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

The Colorado Department of Health may enter into agreements with Federal, State and regional air pollution control agencies. Under State law, agreements requiring compliance in Colorado with any ambient air standard or emission control regulation are not effective until the Air Pollution Control Commission has held a hearing and adopted the standard or regulation.

The Air Pollution Control Division furnishes available data on emissions, air quality and control strategy development for the Four Corner Interstate Air Quality Control Region to other States and local agencies with responsibility for that region.

B. INTRASTATE

In Colorado, responsibility for air pollution control is a cooperative effort of the State and local governments. The Air Pollution Control Commission coordinates State and local air pollution plans and programs and conducts semi-annual conferences with local air pollution control authorities. Each year, the Air Pollution Control Commission and the Colorado Department of Health hold a joint public hearing on State air problems. State and local air pollution laws apply concurrently and independently; compliance with local law does not relieve persons from compliance with State law. Pursuant to delegated authority, local agencies may enforce State air pollution rules and regulations. Local air pollution laws and regulations must be consistent with, but may be more strict than, State laws and regulations. County laws which are more restrictive than those of cities or towns within the county govern to the extent of any inconsistency.

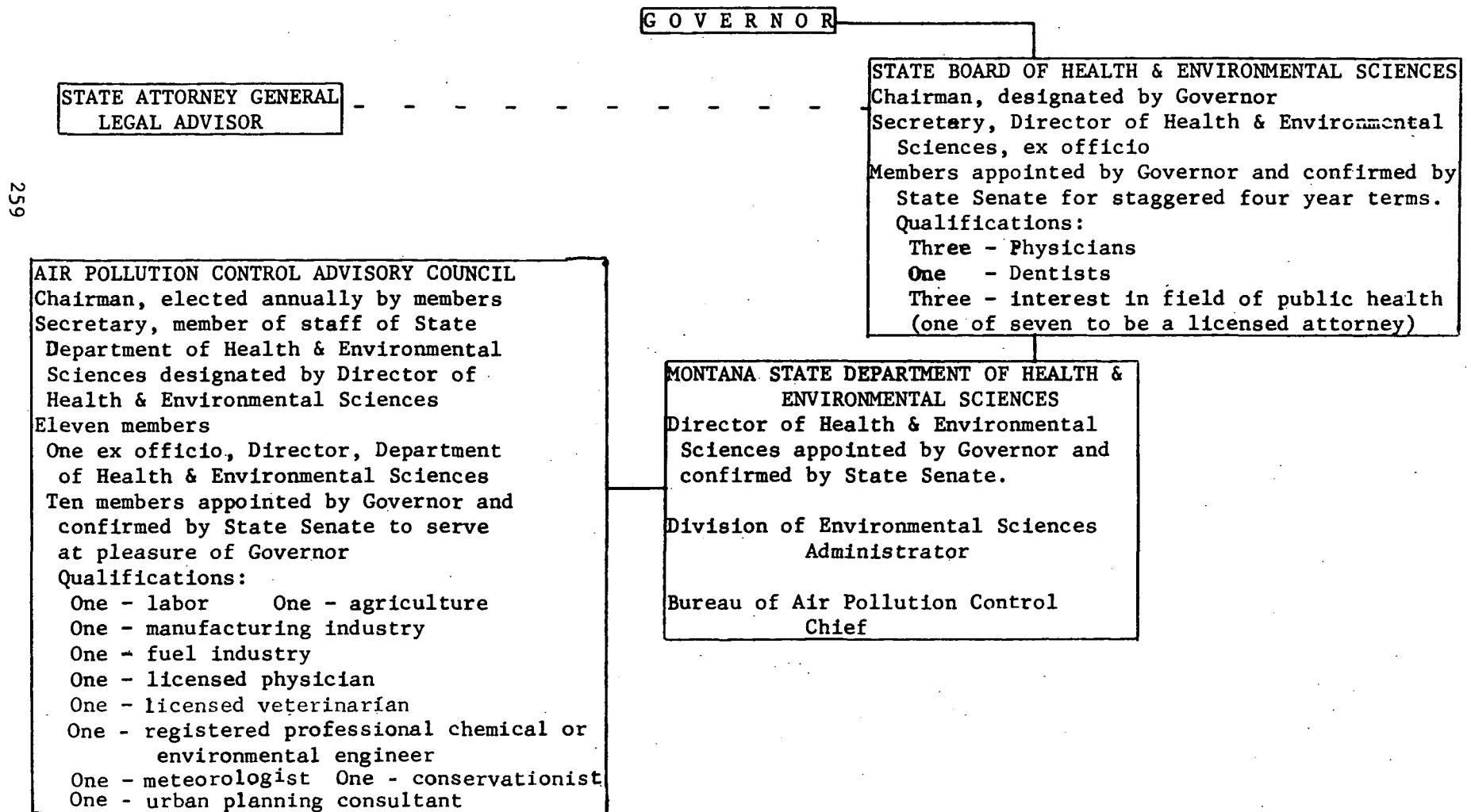

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

The State Department of Health & Environmental Sciences advises, consults, contracts and cooperates with other State agencies, Federal agencies, other States, local governments, interstate and interlocal agencies, industries, and interested persons and groups.

B. INTRASTATE

Montana provides for a coordinated Statewide air pollution control program in which responsibility is shared between the State and local governments. The State encourages local governments to handle air pollution problems within their respective jurisdictions and provides technical and consultative assistance. Subject to the approval, continuing surveillance and assertion of State control where local programs are inadequate, local governments may establish, administer and enforce local air pollution control programs consistent with or more strict than the State program. The State may assume and retain jurisdiction over certain classes of air contaminant sources. Local programs which meet the requirements of the Clean Air Act of Montana are eligible for State aid.

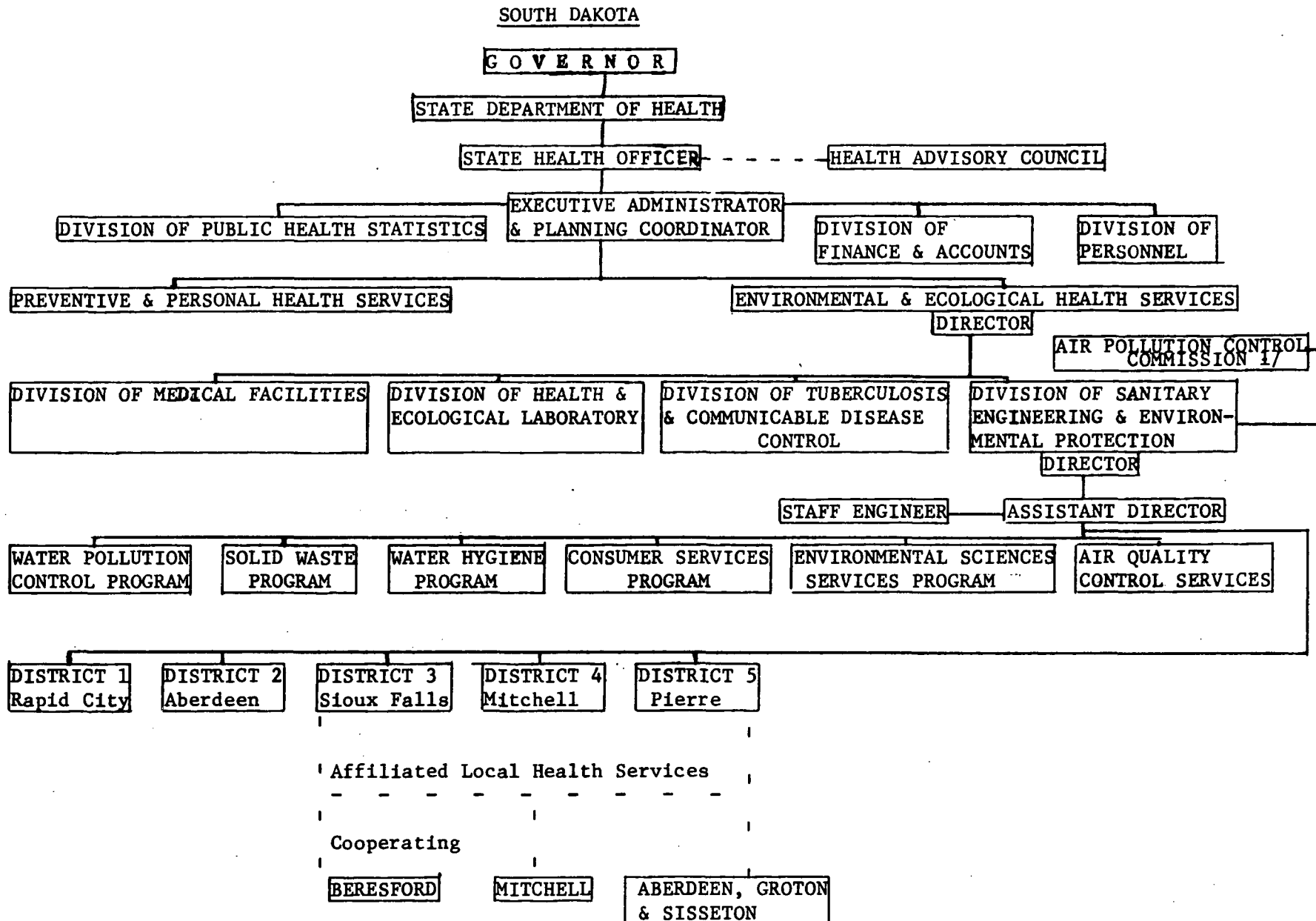

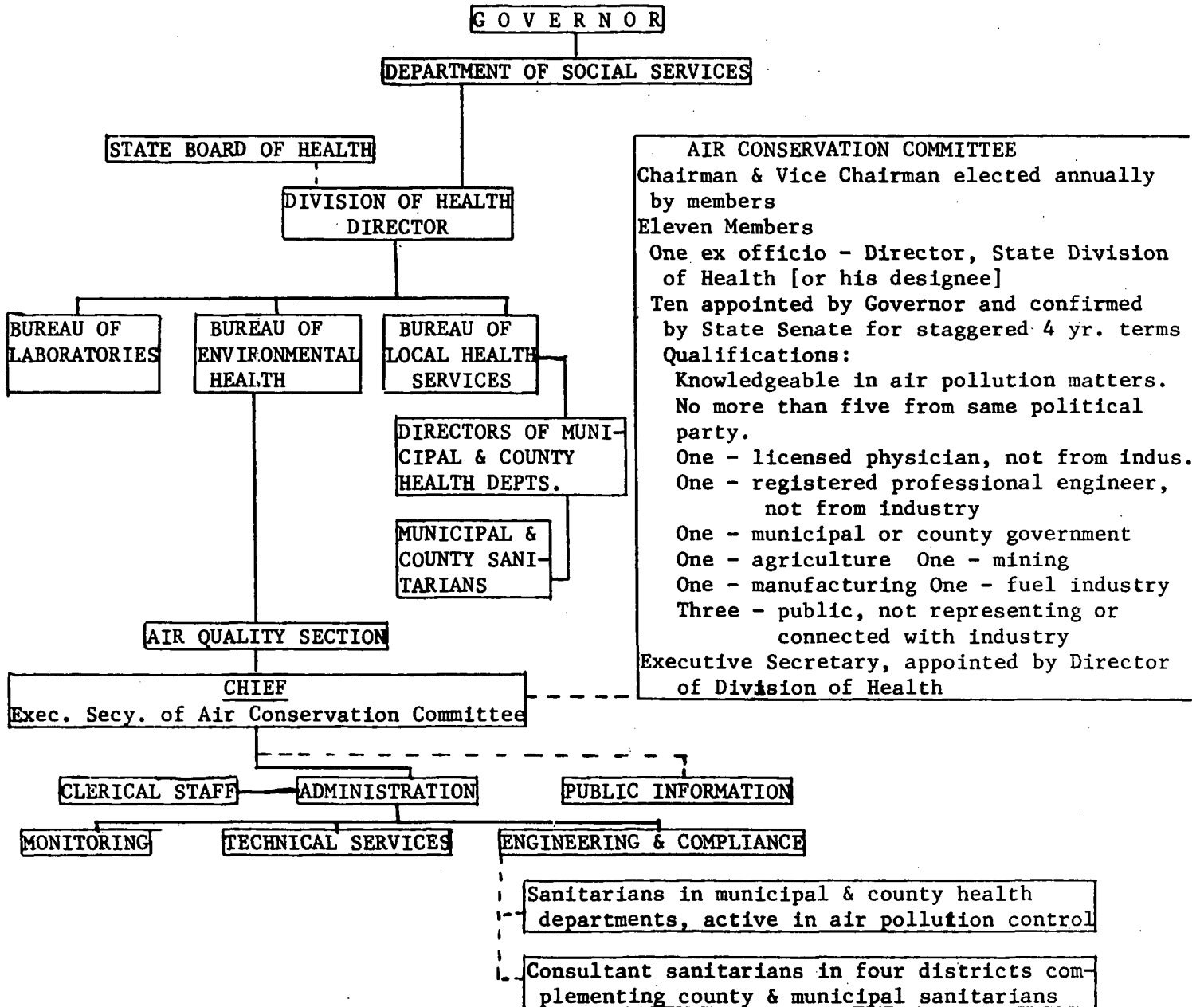

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

The Utah State Division of Health transmits information and data on emissions, air quality and control strategy development to other States in the Four Corners Interstate Air Quality Control Region.

The Air Conservation Committee advises, consults, contracts and cooperates with other State agencies, Federal agencies, other States, interstate and interlocal agencies, local governments, industries, interested persons and groups.

The Executive Secretary of the Air Conservation Committee, with the concurrence of the Director of the Division of Health, represents the State in all interstate air pollution matters, including interstate compacts and other similar agreements.

B. INTRASTATE

Utah has established a coordinated, statewide air pollution control program in which responsibility is shared between the State and local governments. The State encourages local governments to handle air pollution control problems within their respective jurisdictions and provides technical and consultative assistance. Local governments may enact and enforce air pollution control ordinances consistent with State law. Local governments are also authorized to contract and enter into agreements with each other and with the State Division of Health for the purpose of establishing, planning, operating and financing air pollution control programs. State financial aid is available in limited amounts to assist local governments in enforcing State air pollution rules, regulations and standards.

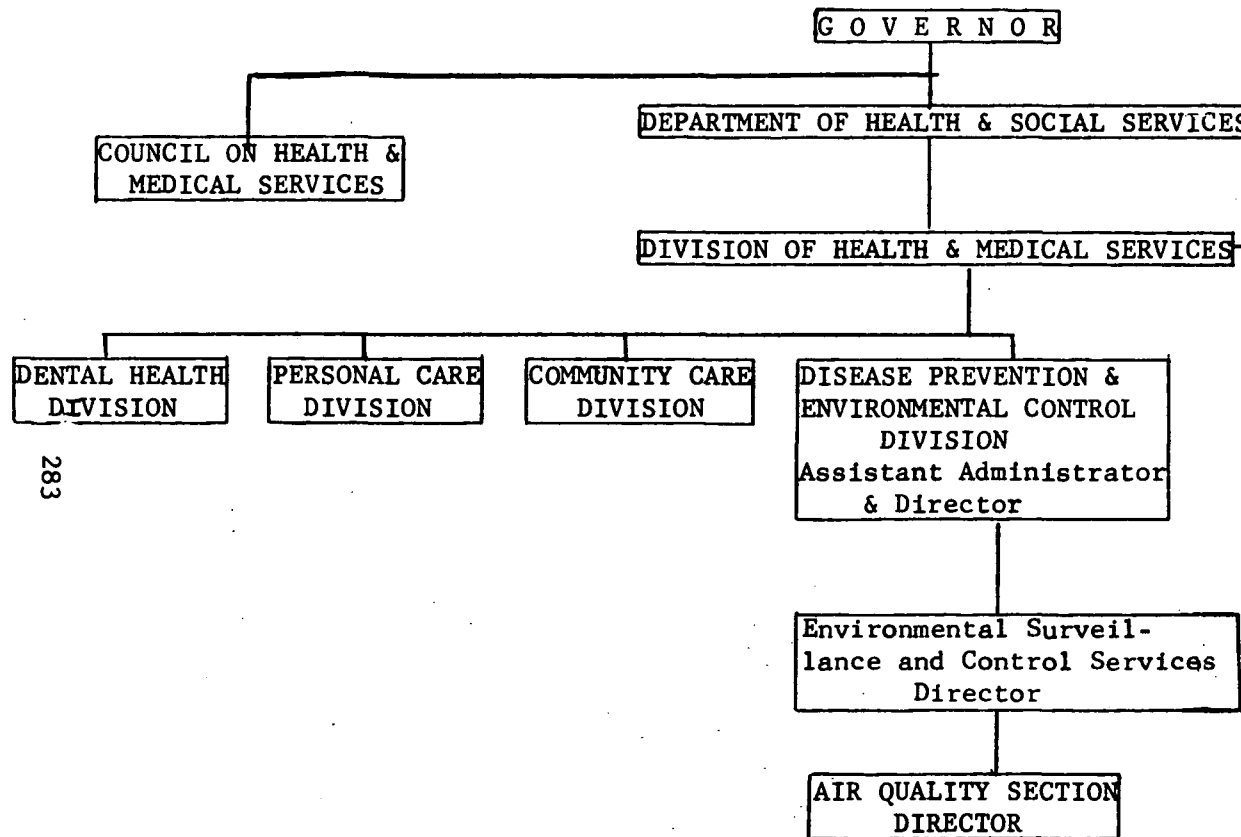

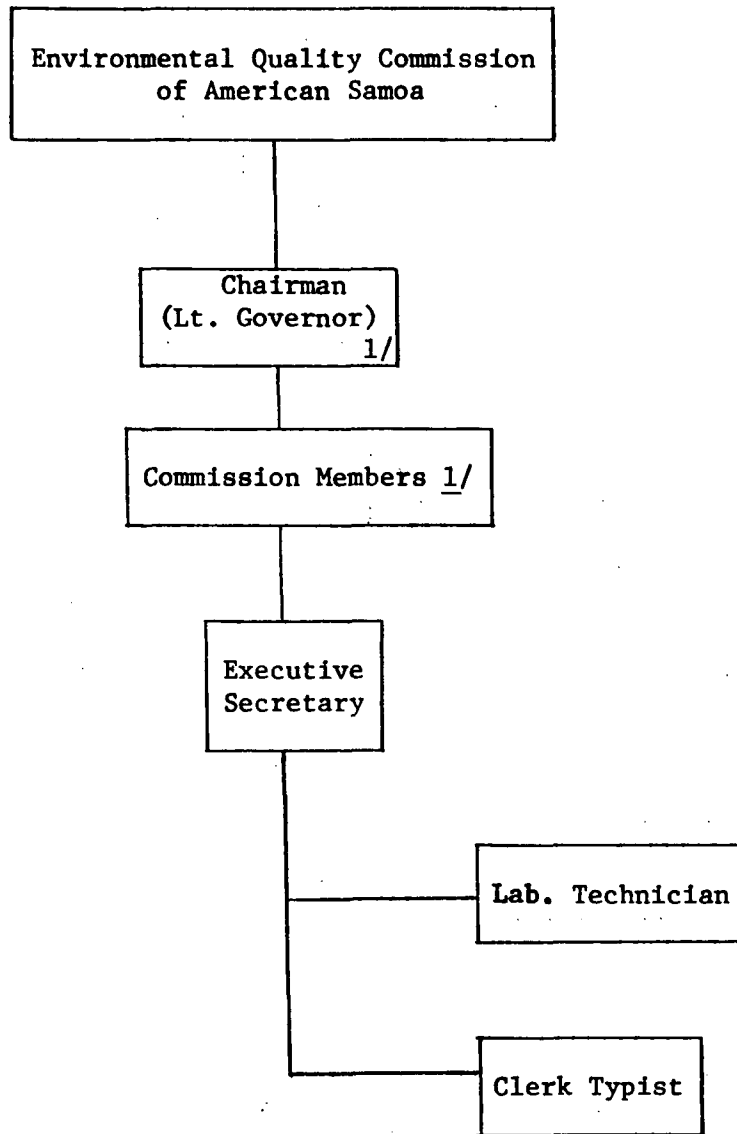

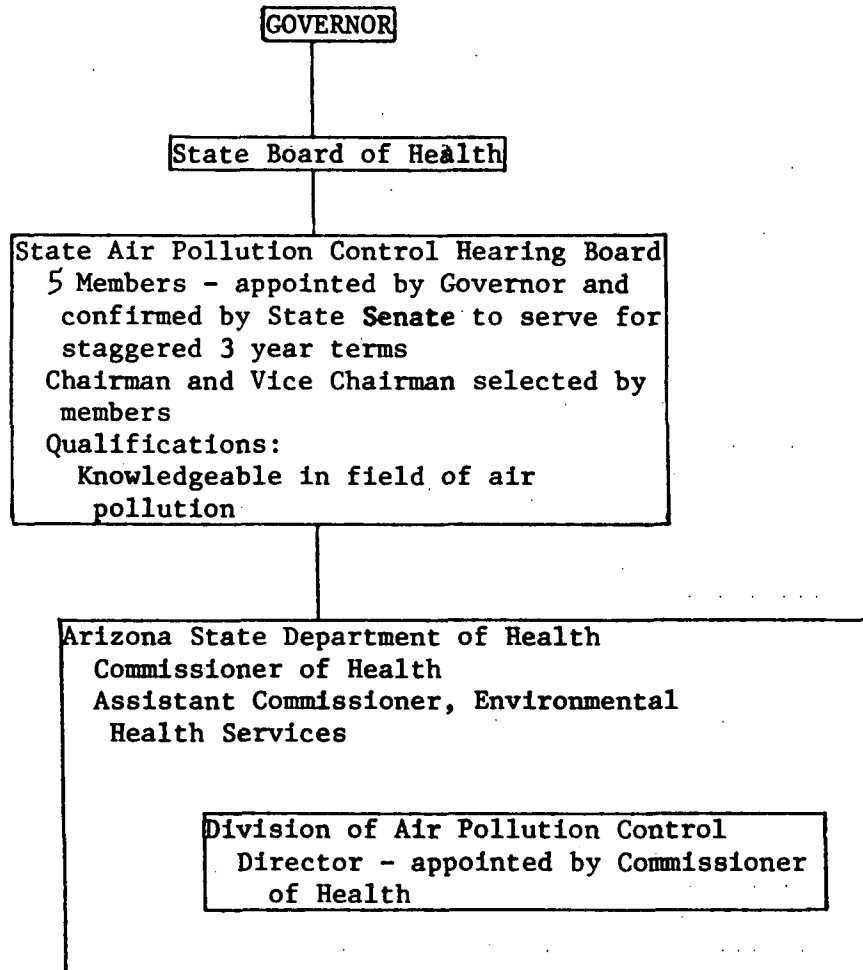

In California, responsibility for air pollution control is shared by the State^{1/} and regional, multi-county or county air pollution control districts, including the Bay Area Air Pollution Control District. 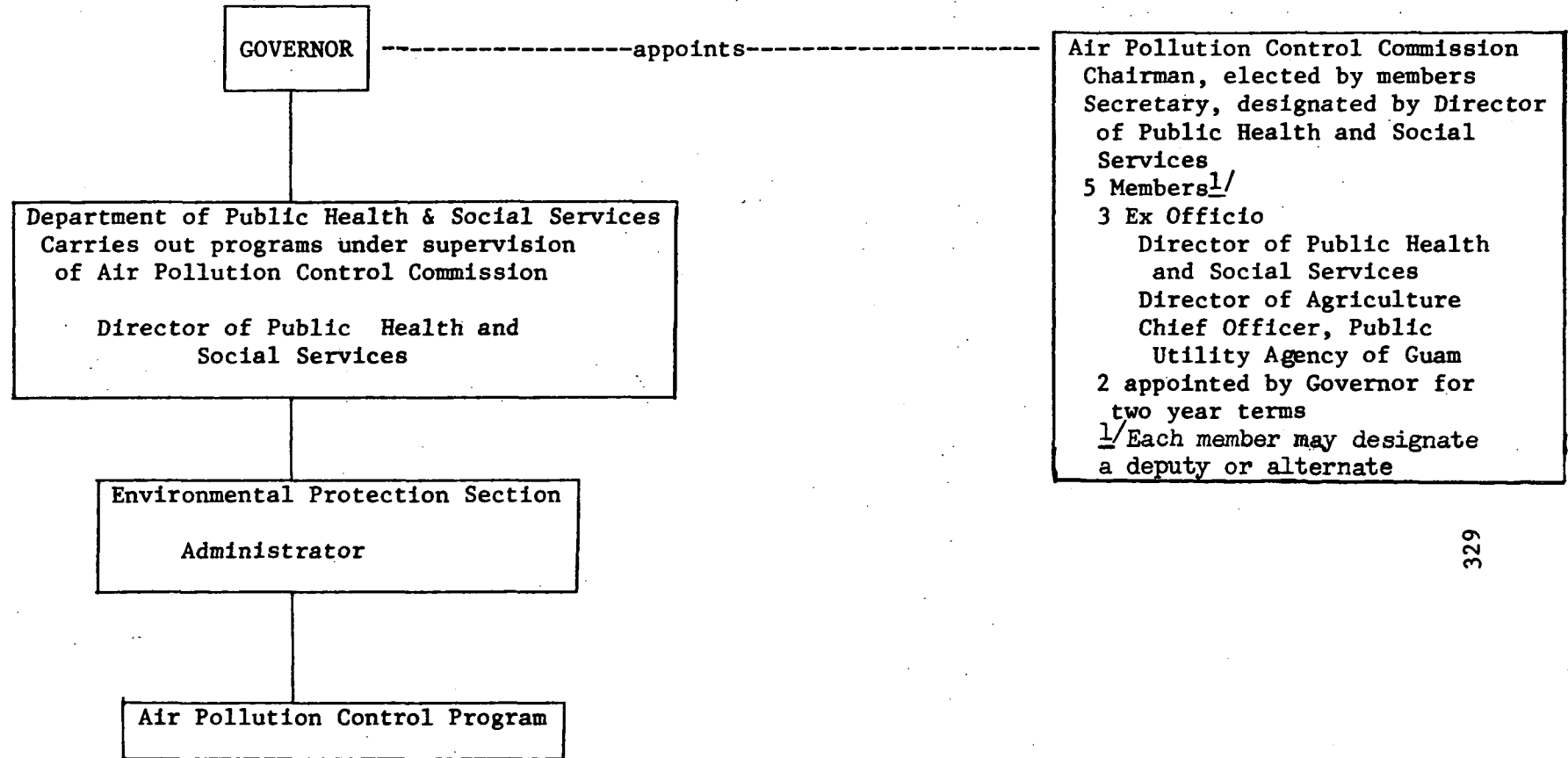

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

In Hawaii, air pollution control is the sole responsibility of the State carried out by the Air Sanitation Branch within the Division of Environmental Health of the Hawaii State Department of Health. There are no local air pollution control agencies in the State of Hawaii. However, the State Department of Health may delegate its enforcement authority to other State and county agencies. At present The Honolulu City and County Police Department exercises this delegated enforcement authority with respect to regulations prohibiting visible emissions from mobile sources and the County Fire Departments exercise this authority with respect to open burning regulations. The Hawaii State Department of Health is also empowered to establish county air pollution control associations to assist the Department by providing advice on county air pollution problems and by reviewing and reporting on Department rules of strictly local application. Under the law, counties may adopt ordinances and regulations governing any matter relating to environmental quality control which is not governed by a rule or regulation of the Department of Health.

II. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COOPERATION

A. INTERSTATE

The State Commission of Environmental Protection cooperates with other State agencies, Federal agencies, other States, interstate agencies, local governments and interested persons. Under Nevada law, all governmental sources of air contaminants are required to comply with all State and local air pollution laws, regulations and ordinances.

Nevada, acting through the Bureau of Environmental Health, of the State Department of Health, Welfare and Rehabilitation, cooperates and exchanges information and data relating to air quality, emissions, air quality surveillance and emergency plans with adjoining States, Arizona, California, Colorado, New Mexico and Utah.

With the approval of the Federal Government, Nevada and California have authorized the Tahoe Regional Planning Agency to plan, adopt, implement and enforce, with the assistance of States, counties and cities within the region, an environmental plan for the Tahoe Basin.

B. INTRASTATE

In Nevada, responsibility for air pollution control is a cooperative effort of the State and local governments. Under the Nevada Air Pollution Control Act^{1/} counties are authorized, subject to continuing State surveillance and assertion of State control where local programs are inadequate, to establish, administer and enforce local air pollution control programs consistent with or more strict than the State program. Where appropriate the State may assume and retain jurisdiction over certain classes of contaminant sources. The Act expressly provides that within their respective jurisdictions, local air pollution control authorities may exercise many of the same powers and responsibilities granted to the State Commission of Environmental Protection and the State Environmental Protection Hearing Board (N.R.S., Title 40, § 445.546(4), (5)).

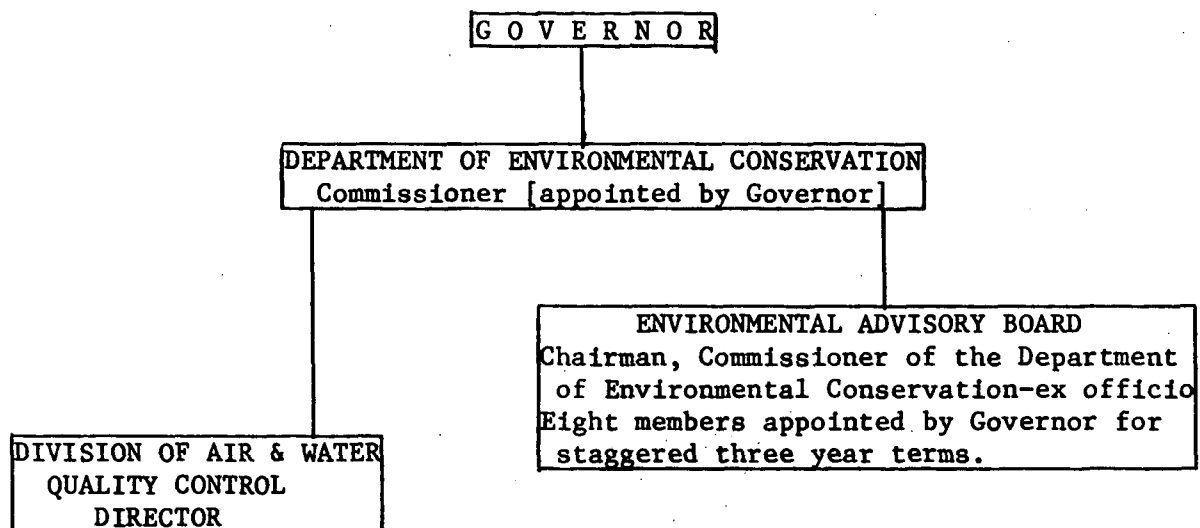

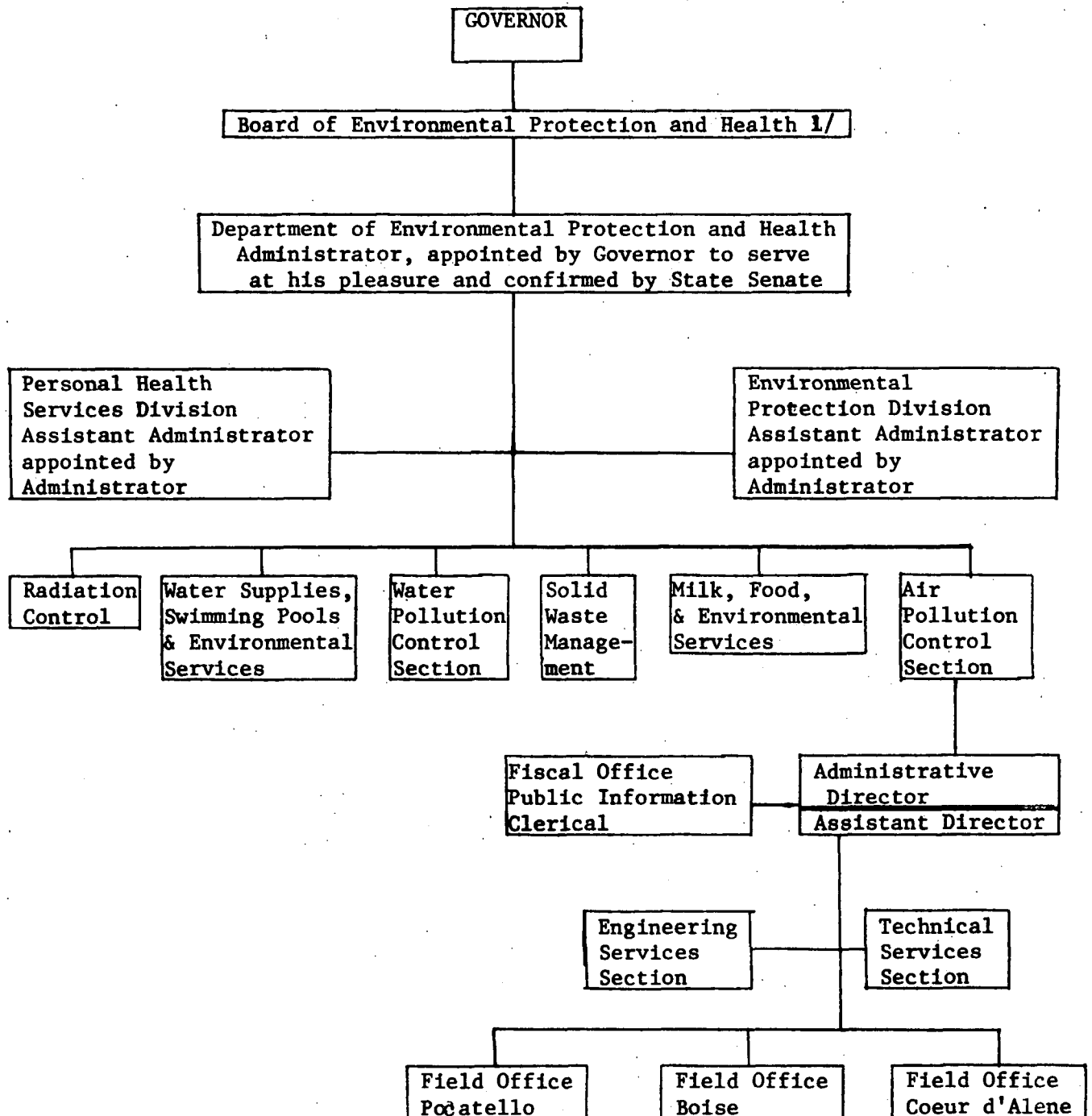

1. 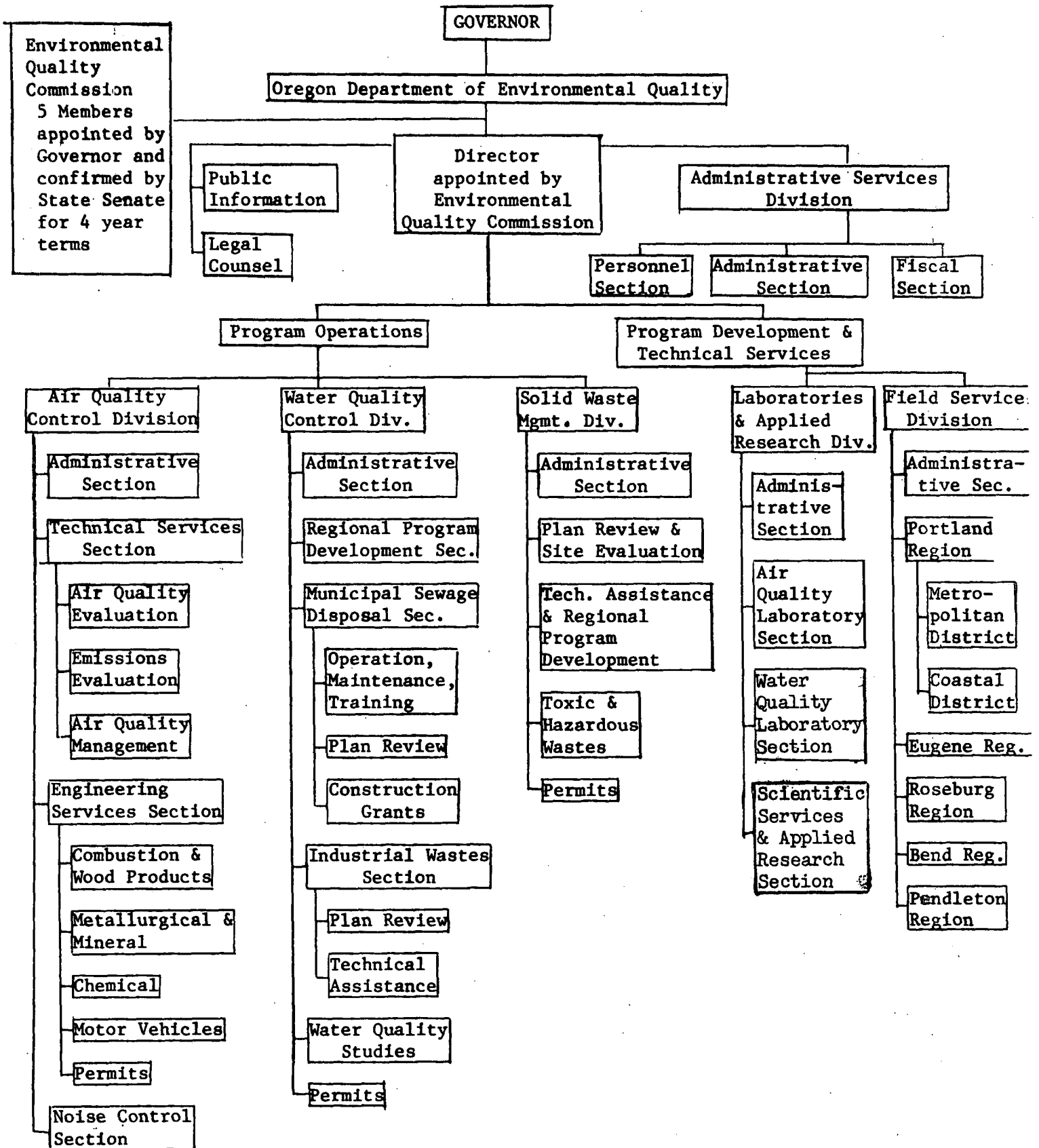

A. INTERSTATE

Oregon and Washington have established an informal interstate committee to facilitate the exchange of information and data, aid in the solution of mutual problems, and develop compatible emergency action plans, and emission inventory and air quality surveillance and monitoring programs.

Subject to the approval, continuing surveillance and assertion of the preemptive power of the State, if a regional program is inadequate, regional air pollution control authorities exercise exclusive jurisdiction over the administration and enforcement of air quality control programs within their respective areas (ORS 449.850 - 449.920). Regional authorities cannot adopt rules and standards less strict than state rules and standards. The State may assume or retain control over certain classes of air contaminant sources within the region

B. INTRASTATE (cont.)

and may require the regional authority to enforce State rules, regulations and orders. Local governments are authorized to enact air pollution control ordinances and administer air pollution control programs which do not conflict with State laws and regulations. Local and regional air pollution control authorities may obtain technical and consultative assistance and financial aid from the State.

The Department of Environmental Quality cooperates with other State agencies with respect to air pollution control matters. When expressly authorized by the Environmental Quality Commission, the State Board of Health and county, district and city boards of health may enforce air pollution rules and regulations promulgated by the Environmental Quality Commission (ORS § 449.064).

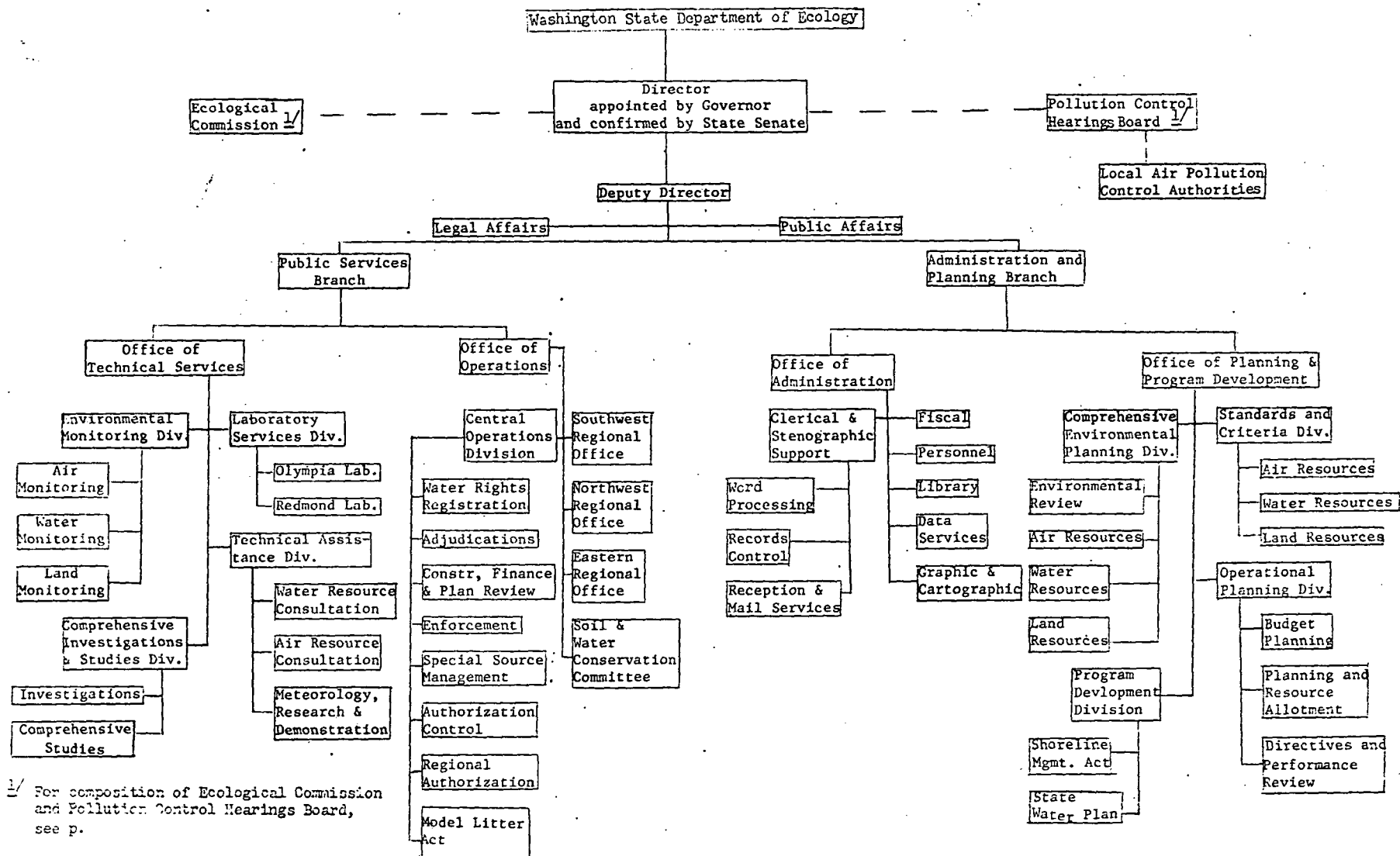

Washington cooperates with Oregon and Idaho in exchanging air quality and emission inventory information, and in developing compatible emergency episode procedures and air quality surveillance and monitoring programs.

Oregon-Washington Air Quality Committee

The Director of the Department of Ecology consults and cooperates with other State agencies, other States, Federal agencies the Canadian Provinces and interstate and international agencies on environmental and air pollution control matters and in the formulation of interstate air pollution control compacts or agreements for submission to the Washington State legislature.

B. INTRASTATE

1. Washington has established a coordinated statewide air pollution control program in which responsibility is shared by the State and regional and local air pollution control authorities. Subject to the preemptive power of the State, regional and local authorities have primary responsibility for the establishment and administration of air control programs and for the enforcement of State air pollution controls or regional or local controls where the latter are equal to or more stringent than those of the State. Local and regional air pollution control authorities may obtain technical and consultative assistance and financial aid from the State.

The State may prescribe emission standards for and assume exclusive jurisdiction over certain classes of air contaminant sources on a statewide basis. Source categories over which the State has assumed jurisdiction include kraft pulping mills, sulfite pulping mills and primary aluminum reduction plants. State agencies are required to comply with State air pollution laws and regulations and to cooperate with the State Department of Ecology.
