


One of the benefits of the process of assembling the information for the catalog was that we were able to critically review a high percentage of the training materials that are available to the public regarding pesticide safety. Of important note is that despite the large number of Hispanics among the farmworker population, only 35 of the 148 publications (25%) are available in Spanish.

More research is needed to determine the specific gaps in educational material and also to determine the most effective formats or medias in which this information can be presented. The goal is education. All people who use or work in the presence of pesticides must be truly informed so that they can protect themselves and their families from the dangerous aspects of pesticides. We recognize the necessity of pesticides in agriculture in order to produce an agricultural product which can compete well on the world's market, and to maintain a production level that will allow for economic survival of our farming community. However, pesticides are dangerous toxins and must be treated as such by all who have contact with them; this includes the grower, the applicator, the farmworker, the packer, and the consumer. Knowledge allows for appropriate, safe use of pesticides, and disallows ignorant abuse and undue panic.

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this catalog is to create a directory of pesticide safety and training materials that are available to the public. In reviewing the needs for information on pesticide safety it became apparent to the U.C. Davis Pesticide Farm Safety Center (PFSC) Staff that there was a large amount of material on this topic, but its existence or availability was not known among individuals who work with pesticides. Similarly, many health care providers were unaware of current information on diagnosis and treatment of pesticide related illness. We therefore created this catalog to publicize the existence of training materials on pesticide health and safety. This catalog is intended for all people who work with pesticides or are concerned with pesticide related illnesses, either directly or indirectly.

The single overriding principle in creating this catalog was that the materials included must be readily available to the public. To the best of our knowledge, all of the items listed here are available upon request or for purchase. We have attempted to provide all the necessary information in the catalog to obtain the materials directly from the suppliers. Unfortunately, we cannot guarantee the availability of the listed material, nor can we guarantee the completeness of the listings. We welcome all readers' comments about this catalog, especially regarding the availability of materials.

DESCRIPTION OF CATALOG LAYOUT

The catalog has five sections: **Introduction and Description of Catalog Layout, How to Use this Catalog, Guide to Materials, Complete List of Materials, and Appendix**. The **How to Use this Catalog** section contains a detailed example of how to search through the catalog to find the materials that best fit your needs. The **Guide to Materials** is organized by sub-headings into which the materials are clustered by topic, based on their content. The sub-headings are as follows: Contaminated Laundry; Disposal, Storage, Spills, & Fires; Equipment & Calibration; Farmworker Specific Material; Handling Safety & Clean-up; Health Care Providers; Home Pesticide Use; Personal Protection; Poisoning & First Aid; Regulatory Issues; Specific Crop or Work Site; Water Concerns; and, Specific Pesticides & Specialized References. Each sub-heading appears in large bold type next to the left margin. The Guide is presented in chart format, with the titles of the materials

appearing on the left margin, followed by a series of X's under column headings which describe the characteristics of the material. The column headings are: State Code, Item, Title, Audience, Language, and Media. The State Code is the state of origin for the material, and uses the two-letter postal zip code format. The intended Audience for each publication is based on the content of the material. The Language column indicates whether the material is available in English and/or Spanish. The Media column describes in what form the information is presented, that is, pamphlet, slides, video, poster, book, or other media.

The **Complete List** (pages 18-77) contains succinct information summaries for each of the training materials. The publications appear in alphabetic order by title and are described in the following format: **Item** number, which is unique to that material, and pertains only to its placement within this catalog; **Title** of the material; **Address** of the source; **Comments**, including the cost to purchase or rent, phone number, date published and ordering numbers if needed; **Audience** that the training material is designed to reach; **Language** and **Media** type in which published; **Abstract** briefly describing the contents; and **Editorial** containing comments from PFSC. The majority of the Abstracts have been written by our staff; however, in the event that the actual material was not available for review, the abstract is that provided by the source agency and the editorial will indicate "not reviewed." The editorial contains comments on the completeness and accuracy of the information, and/or any outstanding features of the material. Instructions on how to use this catalog start on page 6. The **Appendix** contains a list of State Pesticide Information Centers, Poison Control Centers, and regional Environmental Protection Agency offices.

Because the main focus of the catalog is to give the public access to pesticide safety and health information, we have not attempted to include Cooperative Extension pest control manuals that focus on specific types of pests, such as agricultural or aquatic pest control. You should contact the Cooperative Extension offices in your state, or a nearby state, for complete information on specialty pest control manuals. We have also not included material for Certification or Re-certification for Pesticide Applicators. The State Pesticide Information Centers will be the best source of information to the Certified Applicators.

General Editorial Comments

In reviewing the materials for the catalog, we were impressed by the general quality and realize that it is very difficult when developing a training tool to decide what

information to include and what to leave out . However, there were a few important topics that we feel were short-changed in many published materials and thus should be supplemented in any training program:

Respiratory Protection

Only a few of the materials explain that a respirator cannot provide effective protection unless it forms a good seal on the face without making straps uncomfortably tight, and that one brand and size of respirator will not fit all faces.

Every time a person puts on their respirator they should check the fit using positive and negative pressure fit tests and adjust straps if necessary, just as one must periodically adjust the laces on work boots. It is also critical to check valves and straps to see that they are clean and in working order before every use.

It may be dangerous for someone with a respiratory problem to wear a respirator because it makes breathing more difficult. Workers covered by OSHA regulations are required to have a medical clearance (pass a special physical exam) before they are allowed to wear a respirator.

Disposal of Pesticide Containers and Excess Pesticides

The regulations covering disposal of pesticide containers and excess pesticides vary considerably between states. Such regulations are in a constant state of change, and therefore, it is best always to consult both the pesticide label and your local pesticide regulatory or health authorities for up-to-date information on disposal of containers or excess pesticide.

Poisoning First Aid

First aid for pesticide poisoning is covered in the EPA pamphlet by Morgan on Recognition and Management of Pesticide Poisoning (Item #109) and in several other textbooks on first aid. Many pesticide labels include the directive "If swallowed, Do not induce vomiting". This is because the pesticide contains either a corrosive chemical which will burn the throat both going down and coming up, or more commonly, the pesticide contains petroleum products which can cause pneumonia if inhaled into the lungs. For such cases, it is safer to transport the poisoning victim to the hospital immediately. At the hospital vomiting can be induced while precautions are taken to prevent inhalation of the vomit into the lungs. If a delay is unavoidable, contact a Poison Control Center for directions.

Effective Training

Most health educators agree that written materials, videos, and slide shows have limited effectiveness as training tools when used by themselves. A knowledgeable instructor who can answer questions, provide hands-on instruction with appropriate equipment, and hopefully generate meaningful thought and discussion of how to put pesticide safety knowledge into practice, is essential to an effective and thorough pesticide safety training program.

HOW TO USE THIS CATALOG

The quickest way to get information out of this catalog is to start with the **Guide to Materials** which starts on page 9A. Since there are almost 150 different publications listed in the catalog, it is time consuming to read through all of the titles. We suggest that you use the **Sub-headings** in the Guide, which appear in bold lettering at the left margin, as a means of quickly scanning the material available. A list of the sub-headings and their page numbers is shown on page 8, **Guide Sub-headings**. Decide which of the sub-headings best describes the type of information you are seeking, and turn to that section of the Guide. For example, if you are looking for a slide set on pesticide safety to present to a Spanish speaking audience of farmworkers, first turn to the Farmworker Specific Materials sub-heading in the Guide, which begins on page 10B. Then, read the headings which appear across the top of the page to find the column headings that best describe the kind of material that you need. In our example, we scan down both the Spanish and Slides columns looking for a pair of "X's"; the first pair shows up on page 11A, item #32. Look at the example below:

The title of this item, "Farmworkers Pesticide Safety Program," indicates that it is about pesticide safety and therefore fits our example. When you have found a likely title, write down the item number (#32 in our example) for later reference. Continue to scan down the Guide under the selected sub-heading to look for any other titles that might fit your needs. There is one other item that fits our example: it is item #85, "Pesticides: A Guide for Farmworkers." After scanning under the column heading(s) that you originally chose, it may be beneficial to go back and read all of the titles within that sub-heading to see if there are any other materials that could be of interest. Be sure to note the item numbers for later reference.

After scanning the titles under your first choice sub-heading, go back to the Guide Sub-heading list, (page 8), and look for another sub-heading that may contain material of interest to you. In this example, material on pesticide safety for farmworkers also appears under the sub-heading Handling Safety & Clean-up. There are two slide sets in Spanish with titles that indicate that the material concerns pesticide safety; they are item #76, "Pesticide Safety for Non-certified Mixers, Loaders, and Applicators," and item #116, "Safe Handling of Pesticides."

After checking the Guide, and noting the item numbers that look promising, turn to the **Complete List** which begins on page 18. The Complete List contains all of the materials arranged in alphabetic order by title, and it is numbered sequentially so that individual item numbers are easy to find. Check the expanded description under each of the item numbers that you have selected. We recommend that you read the **Abstract** and **Editorial** first so that you can determine if the selected publications contain the information that you are seeking. The rest of the information for that item will include: cost to purchase or rent, where to order, order codes, phone numbers, publishing date, language, media, and intended audience.





Todas las personas que usan o trabajan en la presencia de pesticidas tienen que ser correctamente informadas para que puedan protegerse a si mismos y a sus familias de los aspectos peligrosos de los pesticidas. Reconocemos la necesidad de los pesticidas en la agricultura para producir un producto agrícola que pueda competir de manera eficaz en el mercado mundial y mantener un nivel de producción que permita a nuestra comunidad agrícola sobrevivir económicamente. Sin embargo, los pesticidas son toxinas peligrosas y deben de tratarse como tales por todos aquellos quienes tienen contacto con los pesticidas; incluyendo al agricultor el aplicador, el trabajador agrícola, el empacador y el consumidor. INTRODUCCION

Este catálogo ha sido escrito con el propósito de crear un directorio sobre la seguridad / protección de pesticidas y de materiales educativos disponibles al público en general. Viendo la necesidad de informar acerca de los pesticidas El Centro de Protección de Pesticidas en Cultivos y Ganado de UCD (PFSC), se dió cuenta que existe una gran cantidad de materiales sobre este tema, para aquellas personas que trabajan con pesticidas, desgraciadamente muchas de ellas no tenian conocimiento de su existencia o acceso. De la misma manera muchos suministradores del cuidado de salud no estaban enterados acerca de la información más reciente en el diagnóstico y tratamiento de enfermedades relacionadas con pesticidas. Es por eso que hemos creado este catálogo para hacer publicidad a la existencia de los materiales educativos en salud y protección sobre pesticidas. Este catálogo es para todas aquellas personas que trabajan con pesticidas o para aquellas que esten interesadas en las enfermedades relacionadas con los pesticidas, ya sea directa o indirectamente.

El objetivo fundamental en la creación de este catálogo es que los materiales que se incluyan tengan que estar fácilmente disponibles al público. Tenemos entendido que todos los materiales en la lista estan a la disposición para su solicitud o compra. Hemos tratado de proporcionar toda la información necesaria en el catálogo para obtener los materiales directamente de los abastecedores. Desgraciadamente no podemos garantizar su acceso, tampoco podemos asegurar la perfección de la lista de materiales. Los comentarios de los lectores acerca del catálogo seran bien recibidos, especialmente aquellos que se traten del acceso a los materiales educativos.

DESCRIPCION DEL ORDEN O ARREGLO DEL CATALOGO

El catálogo cuenta con cinco secciones: **Introducción y descripción del orden o arreglo del catálogo; Como usar este catálogo; Guía de materiales; Lista completa de materiales; y Apéndice.** La sección de Como usar este catálogo contiene ejemplos detallados para encontrar los materiales más convenientes a sus necesidades. La **Guía de materiales** esta organizada según sub-títulos en los cuales los materiales educativos estan agrupados de acuerdo al tema, basados en su contenido. Los sub-títulos son los siguientes (materiales disponibles solamente en Español): Cosecha específica / Sitio de trabajo; Materiales educativos, particularmente para el trabajador del campo; Preocupaciones acerca del agua; Seguridad en el manejo y limpieza; Suministradores del cuidado de salud; y

Uso de pesticidas en casa. Cada sub-título aparece escrito en negritas grandes al lado del margen izquierdo. La Guía esta presentada en el formato-gráfica, los titulos de los materiales aparecen en el margen izquierdo, seguidos por una serie de "X's" bajo la columna de los encabezados los cuales describen las características del material. La columna de encabezados contiene lo siguiente: Código del Estado, Número, Título, Destinatario, Idioma, y Medios. El Código del Estado es el estado de origen del material, y utiliza las dos letras del formato del código postal. El contenido de la publicación determina o designa el Destinatario. La columna relacionada con el Idioma indica si el material esta disponible en Inglés y / o en Español. La columna que se refiere a Medios describe la forma en que el material educativo esta presentado por ejemplo: folleto, diapositivas, video, cartel, libro, u otro.

La **Lista Completa** (páginas 94 - 110) contiene resumenes con información precisa y adecuada de cada uno de los materiales educativos. Todas las publicaciones estan escritas en orden alfabético y por título, las cuales se describen en la forma o formato siguiente: **Número** del articulo o material; **Título** del material; **Dirección** de donde proviene el material; **Comentario**, el cual incluye el costo o alquiler, número de teléfono, fecha de publicación, y el número de pedido cuando es necesario; **Destinatario**, nos indica para quién esta diseñado el material; **Idioma** y **Medios**, simplemente nos dicen como estan publicados los materiales; el **Resumen**, describe brevemente el contenido del material; y el **Editorial** tiene comentarios del PFSC. La gran mayoría de los editoriales han sido escritos por nuestro personal docente, sin embargo en los casos cuando los materiales no estaban disponibles para su revisión, el editorial que aparezca es aquel dado por la agencia o institución de donde proviene y el editorial leera, "sin revision". El editorial cuenta con información acerca de la perfección y exactitud del material, y también hace nota de lo mas sobresaliente del material. Las instrucciones para usar este catálogo empiezan en la página 86. El **Apéndice** contiene una lista de centros de información sobre pesticidas, centros para el control de envenenamiento, y oficinas locales de la Agencia de Protección del Medio Ambiente. (El apéndice no se tradujo al Español.)

Debido a que el objetivo principal de este catálogo es proveer al público el acceso a la información sobre protección de pesticidas y salud; no hemos incluido manuales sobre el control de pestes que enfocan en ciertos tipos de plagas como aquellos que controlan pestes acuáticas y en la agricultura. Ud. debe comunicarse con las oficinas estatales que se encargan de este tipo de control, ya sea en su propio Estado o en el más cercano a Ud. para obtener información completa de manuales especializados en este tipo de control de pestes. Tampoco hemos incluido materiales

relacionados con la certificación o re-certificación de las personas que aplican pesticidas. Los centros estatales de Información sobre pesticidas seran los mejores lugares para obtener la información acerca de la certificación.

Comentarios generales del Editorial

Cuando se hizo la revisión de los materiales educativos para este catálogo, la calidad de ellos, en general, nos causó una gran impresión y nos dimos cuenta de la dificultad que existe cuando se dearrolla un material didáctico, porque no es fácil escoger entre el material que se va a escribir y aquel que quedará excluido. Sin embargo dentro del material publicados hubo algunos temas de importancia que creemos que carecen de información. También creemos que todo programa educativo debe hacer hincapié en lo siguiente:

Protección relacionada con la Respiración

Solamente muy pocos de los materiales explican que los respiradores artificiales no proveen una protección eficaz a menos de que esten bien colocados y sellados en la cara de la persona que los usa; tampoco explican acerca del tamaño ni tipo apropiado para la cara de la persona.

Cada vez que una persona use un respirador artificial, debe de ajustarlo y cerciorarse que este en buenas condiciones y hacer los ajustes necesarios; de la misma manera que hacemos cuando nos abrochamos los zapatos de trabajo. También es de suma importancia ver que las válvulas y correas del respirador artificial esten limpias y listas para usarse.

Tal vez sea peligroso que una persona lleve un respirador artificial cuando tiene problemas respiratorios porque puede tener dificultades al respirar. Los trabajadores que estan cubiertos por el Reglamento de OSHA tienen que pasar una examinación física especial antes de usar respiradores artificiales.

Deshecho de los recipientes o envases de pesticidas y el exeso de pesticidas

Los reglamentos que se encargan del deshecho de los recipientes o envases de pesticidas varian considerablemente de un Estado a otro. Tales reglamentos constantemente estan variando; es por eso que se recomienda que lea las etiquetas de los pesticidas y consulte con el reglamento local o con las autoridades de salubridad para obtener una información al corriente en lo que respecta al deshecho o exceso de pesticidas.

Primeros auxilios en caso de envenenamiento

El folleto de EPA por Morgan en Recognition and Management of Pesticide Poisoning (Item #110) y otros libros de texto cubren primeros auxilios en caso de envenenamiento debido a los pesticidas. Muchas etiquetas de pesticidas llevan la siguiente orden "If swallowed, do not induce vomiting" "Si se toma, no provoque el vómito". Esto es porque los pesticidas contienen, ya sea productos químicos corrosivos, los cuales arden o irritan la garganta cuando se toman y cuando se vomitan o más comúnmente los pesticidas contienen productos derivados del petróleo los cuales pueden causar pulmonía si se inhalan dentro de los pulmones. En estos casos lo más seguro es transportar a la víctima a un hospital inmediatamente. En el hospital el vómito se puede provocar tomando las debidas precauciones. Si la demora es inevitable llame a un Centro de Control de Envenenamiento para recibir instrucciones.

Educación o entrenamiento eficaz

La mayoría de educadores de salud están de acuerdo que los materiales escritos, videos, y exposición de diapositivas tienen solamente cierta efectividad como auxiliares didácticos. Un instructor con conocimientos que pueda contestar preguntas, provee una enseñanza a la mano con el equipo apropiado y se espera que enseñe y discuta como poner en práctica el conocimiento de la protección sobre pesticidas. Para tener un programa de educación o entrenamiento de pesticidas es esencial que se enseñe de una manera eficaz.

COMO USAR ESTE CATALOGO

La forma mas rápida de obtener información de este catálogo es empezar con la Guía de Materiales que esta en la página xx. Debido a que hay casi 150 publicaciones en la lista de este catálogo sería una perdida de tiempo estar leyendo todos los titulos. Se le sugiere que lea los sub-titulos en la Guía de Materiales los cuales aparecen en el margen izquierdo como un medio de rápida examinación de los materiales disponibles. Una lista de los sub-titulos se encuentra en la página 90.

La **Lista de Sub-títulos** de la Guía de Materiales nos muestra cual sub-título describe el tipo de información deseada y nos derige a esa sección de la Guía. Por ejemplo, si Ud. esta buscando un juego de diapositivas sobre la protección de pesticidas para presentarlas a los trabajadores del campo en Español, primero tiene que dirigirse al sub-título en la Guía de Materiales que se llama Materiales educativos particularmente para el trabajador del campo, el cual se encuentra el la página 91B. Luego lea los encabezados que aparecen en la parte superior de la página para encontrar la columna de encabezados que mejor describa el tipo de material que Ud. necesite. En este ejemplo que aqui hemos dado, hemos tomado ambas columnas Español y Diapositivas buscando un par de "X's", el primer par aparece en la página 92A, articulo número 85. El título de este articulo o número es "Pesticidas: Guía para los trabajadores del campo", el cual nos indica acerca de la protección sobre pesticidas por consiguiente va de acuerdo con nuestro ejemplo. Cuando Ud. haya encontrado un título deseado escriba el número del articulo, (por ejemplo 85 en nuestra caso) para usarlo como referencia más tarde. Continue examinando (viendo) la Guía de Materiales bajo los sub-titulos seleccionados para que encuentre otros materiales que puedan satisfacer sus necesidades. Hay otro articulo o número que también esta relacionado con nuestro ejemplo: es el número 32, "Protección de pesticidas para los trabajadores del campo."

Después de ver bajo la columna de encabezado(s) que Ud. escogió en un principio, tal vez seria prudente que Ud. se regrese y lea todos los materiales dentro de ese sub-título para ver si hay otros materiales que sean de interes para Ud. Asegurese de anotar el número del articulo para tenerlo como futura referencia.
