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SUBJECT: Laboratory Certification for Water Quality Parameters

On June 7, 1991, EPA published the Final Lead and Copper Rule in the *Federal Register*. The preamble for this Rule (page 26513) states that laboratories are not required to be certified to test for water quality parameters; but the codified rule is not so clear. The list of analytical test methods for lead, copper, and the water quality parameters is found in 40 CFR §141.89 (a). This section [§141.89 (a)(1)] also states, "Analyses under this section shall only be conducted by laboratories that have been certified by EPA or the State. To obtain certification for lead and copper, laboratories must:"

Because the water quality parameters are included in §141.89 (a) along with lead and copper, it seems that laboratories must be certified to test for water quality parameters as well. Was it EPA's intent to require laboratories to be certified to test for water quality parameters?

Response:

The preamble of the Lead and Copper Rule is correct; laboratories only have to be certified for lead and copper testing, not for water quality parameters.
